**LABOR NEWS**  
**CONDEMN CONGRATULATIONS.**  
Builders and laborers at a very largely attended meeting held on Tuesday night unanimously condemned the recent action of the Toronto Trades Council in congratulating the proletariat of Hunland upon its activities in the great central empire, erstwhile Emperor Wilhelm's domain.  
**INITIATE MANY MEMBERS.**  
Local 152, Stationary Engineers, last night initiated 26 new members. This union now has a large membership with a returned soldier, an original of the 7th Battalion as its business manager, Comrade T. B. Reid is well known in Toronto labor circles.  
**EVENTFUL EXECUTIVE SESSION.**  
Friday night will be a busy one for the executive of the Canadian Hoisting Engineers of which body Comrade William O'Brien is the presiding genius. This union now has 10 members, and the business manager stated yesterday afternoon that not one of them was out of work, a record hard to surpass.  
**SCHEDULE DRAWN UP.**  
District No. 46, International Association of Machinists, has drawn up its schedule for the ensuing year. Rumor was spread that it demanded a wage of a dollar an hour, with a 44 hour week. Herbert Lewis, business manager for the union in Toronto, refused to either confirm or deny the report.  
**BIG CONVENTION SATURDAY.**  
Saturday will witness the semi-annual convention of the provincial council of the International Association of Machinists in Toronto. There will be easily 60 delegates, and they will represent such notable centres as Kitchener, Brantford, Oshawa, London, Kingston, Port Arthur, Sault Ste. Marie, Windsor, Hespeler and other points. Many important matters will be taken up, among others that of representation in the Canadian council of the metal trades section of the American Federation of Labor.  
**LONGSHOREMEN TO MEET.**  
Longshoremen and coal drivers are holding a very important meeting tonight at St. O. Hall to thoroughly discuss the situation relative to the wage schedule. This union now has a membership of more than eight hundred.  
**ORGANIZING STRENUOUSLY.**  
Officials of the Painters' and Decorators' Union are organizing strenuous campaign during the ensuing two months, and initiation fees are to be doubled commencing May 23. The present initiation fee is ten dollars. This will be increased to \$20. Joseph Hunter, the sixth vice-president of the international union, is taking much interest in the campaign.

**CITY HALL NOTES**

Eighty-six communications came up before the board of control at yesterday morning's session, which almost set a precedent as far as numbers are concerned. The majority of them, however, were of little importance, and many more were merely communications which had been laid over from former meetings. The board waded thru them in record style.  
The recommendation of Parks Commissioner Chambers was adopted by the board, and W. J. Reid is the successful tenderer for refreshment concessions in Toronto's parks. Several other tenders were also received, but Reid's was the highest. His tender included the following amounts for refreshment privileges: Island Park \$10,000, High Park \$9,750, Ryerdale Park \$4,650, and Kew Gardens \$3,000, a total of \$27,900. In addition to this ten per cent. of the gross proceeds derived from these booths must be paid into the city's coffers.  
A special committee of the city council comprising Aldermen Hiltz, chairman; Flewman, Hamilton, Cowan, Winnett and Miskelly, will be appointed to report on a temporary housing policy for Toronto.  
The subject presented itself when the controllers were considering a letter from W. S. B. Armstrong who advocated calling a meeting to form a town planning and housing association, on which it was decided to call for a report from Parks Commissioner Chambers.  
Works Commissioner Harris will report on the matter of including the city railway employees in the new cent. general salary increase. They were not included in the original recommendation.  
George H. Gooderham, chairman of the Toronto-Hamilton Highway Commission, expressed indignation in a letter to the board at the action of that body in only granting \$1,000 to the Ontario Safety League.  
"This is a work which should be carried on entirely by civic grant," he wrote. "If the council are going to deal with it in a manner such as this, I think that I will discontinue subscribing, and also use my time now employed in the interests of the Safety League, to my own personal advantage."

A deputation representing several local associations requested the insertion in the 1920 civic estimates of \$170,000 for the purchase of Scarboro Beach Park. The mayor told them that it was not necessary to have the sum in the estimates in order to negotiate for the said purchase.  
The controllers by way of diversion held a short session in private, and it is understood, discussed the proposed sale by the board of education of the Bloor street school site. The general consensus of opinion of the members was that the property should be taken back by the city, rather than permit of its disposal for \$217,000.  
Assessment Commissioner Forman submitted a report in which he stated that the city had a higher valuation than the figure being considered by the board of education. The commissioner thinks the property is worth \$400,000.  
Some insinuations that the rumored resignation of Finance Commissioner Bradshaw has been caused by the
