For 1925 the number of ocean steamships in port was 413 with a total tonnage of 1,207,805. For 1924 the number was 299 and the tonnage was 787, 301. The number of sailing vessels for 1925 was 71 as compared with 95 for 1924. Clared to be in large measure accounted for by the increased shipments of sugar and potatoes last year. The Island City, while bound from Chatham, N. B., to New York with a cargo of laths, ran ashore in 1905 near Cape Bauld, east of Shediac, the crew escaping. The wreck was purchased by R. C. Tait and Capt. Bray, of this town, the schooner was refloated and transferred to F. W. Sumner and William Edgett, of Moncton.
