"This means that women will be in charge of women's athletics and they are better able to judge what other women are capable of than are men," asserted Miss E. M. Cartwright.

Women coaches will replace men and there will be less egotism of women's teams by their coaches and managers. In fact it affords a protection for the woman athlete which she had previously been denied. It is a physical instruction, the status of non-competing amateurs in all organized sports.

"This gives them the same standing as the men who occupy similar positions. Hitherto, the woman teacher of gymnastics was regarded as a professional," Miss Cartwright said.

### BOXING OFTEN IS FATAL TO FILIPINOS

#### No Less Than Three Stars Have Died Following Hard Contests

CHICAGO, Ill., April 22.—Only one of a quartet of Filipino youngsters selected by Frank Churchill in Manila and trained to a boxing brilliance that enabled them to contest upon an equality with the best of their weight in the world, remains alive and able to carry on—Pete Sarmento, the largest of the group and at that only a featherweight.

Cleaver Sencio, who died Tuesday in Milwaukee, after a terrific ten round bout with Bud Taylor, Terre Haute, challenger for the world's bantam weight title, was the third to pass on in that manner.

Young Dencio was the first. He died after a grueling fight with Bert McCarthy in Melbourne, Australia. Previously Dencio collapsed after his fight with Eugene Cright, of France, former world's featherweight champion, but recovered. Then came Pancho Villa, who soared to heights just beyond the reach of his three little brown brothers in winning the world's flyweight championship, only to die too, after a fight with a featherweight.

The unusual record of deaths of the little Filipinos has caused Chicago ring followers to wonder if there was something in the tropical make-up to render them unable to follow the fast pace set by their white foemen of the roped arena.

Certainly the series of deaths is without parallel in boxing history, and each of them followed hard smashing contests in which, exhausted to the verge of death, none of the Filipinos gave an inch, but fought terrifically to the final bell, or as in the case of Dencio until he had a hard smash rendered him completely hors de combat.

### CAUSES SPECULATION

Another Filipino fight under the name of Young Dencio, being registered with boxing commissions as a resident of Washington, D. C. The second Young Dencio, at present in Toronto where he will fight shortly, adopted that fighting name after the death of his namesake who was killed in Australia, according to boxing authorities.

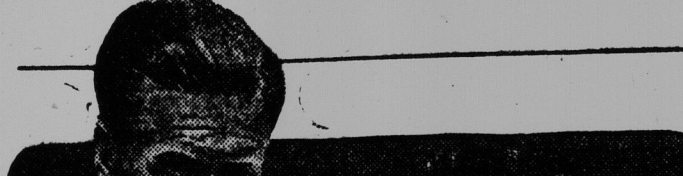
