## SIXTEEN ENTRIES FOR GIRLS MEET HERE TOMORROW

Events to be Held Monday if Weather Bad Tomorrow

SIXTEEN entries from outside points have been received for the first Maritime track meet for girls on the Allison grounds tomorrow afternoon and with elaborate preparations by an efficient committee completed, all that is needed to put this unique athletic meet over big is fine weather and a record crowd of spectators. It has been announced that in case of bad weather, the events will be run off on Monday afternoon next.

This morning word was received by Miss Marion Belding, president of the W. A. A. F. for the Maritimes, that eight additional entries from outside were being made. Four came from Richibucto, N. B., and four from Charlottetown. This brings the total for the meet up to about 45, and is considered excellent in view of the short while women's athletics have been to the fore. Outside competitors are due in the city today.

Following the games, a banquet will be held in the Y. W. C. A., at which prizes will be presented and this will be followed by a motor drive and dance at Gouda Point. 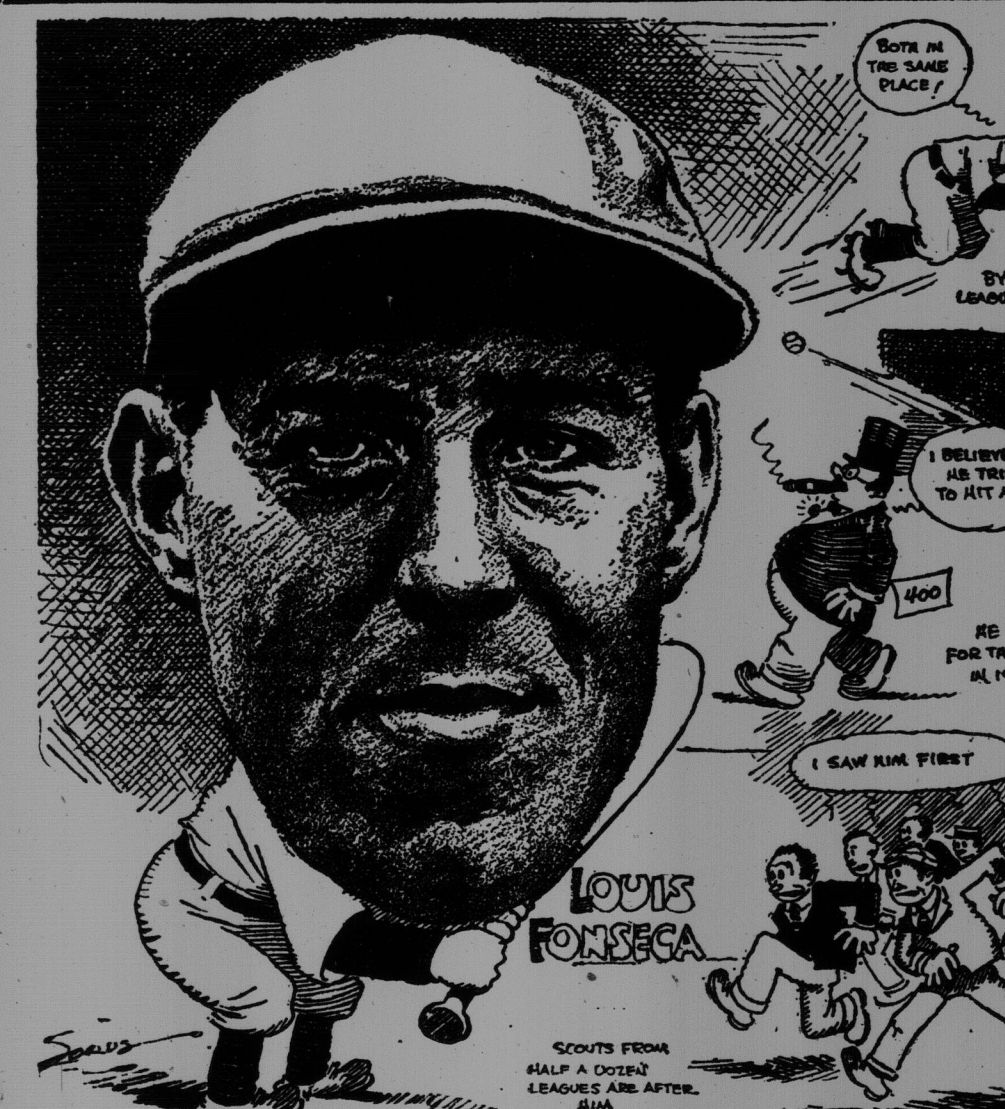

## BITTER FIGHT CONTINUES IN NATIONAL RACE

Three Teams Deadlocked for First Place in League

NEW YORK, June 28.—Once again the red legs of Cincinnati swing from the top of the National League ladder, a position regained without effort. The Reds kept out of the rain in Philadelphia yesterday, while the New York Giants pulled the Pirates back into second position six to five, in the most exciting battle seen at the Polo Grounds this season. It went thirteen innings.

At this point, the youth Lindstrom of the Giants, lifted the first pitch delivered by the aged Adams into the right field stands and won the ball game. This verdict left New York, Chicago and Brooklyn tied for fourth place with a percentage of .508, three games behind the leaders.

Rhem and Keen each allowing six hits, set back the Boston Braves in a double header, 4 to 2, and 6 to 2. Triples by Blades and Bell, of the Cards, led much to do with the decision in the second contest.

Bill Marriot returned to third base for the Dodgers, and celebrated with three singles. In the tenth his sacrifice fly scored the run that defeated the Cubs, 10 to 8. Twelve errors were made during the afternoon.

In the American League the New York Yankees, including Ruth, found themselves helpless before Blankenship and bowed to the White Sox 6 to 2.

Washington accepted another beating at the hands of St. Louis, 9 to 7, the Browns scoring three circuit blows, by Williams, Schang and Durst. The Williams' loop scored four runs in the second.
