Fourteen disputes began or were in progress during the month affecting 9,224 employees and causing a loss of 229,204 working days. The previous month there were 23 disputes affecting 13,872 employees and 244,673 working days were lost.

HERRIOT AND HIS

THANKED FOR WORK

Report of Conference Goes

Before Senate and Cham-

(By Canadian Press.) Paris, Aug. 19.—The French cabinet today unanimously approved the work of the French delegation at the international

conference in London, and

thanked it for the important results it had attained in the interests of France. The cabinet met this morning, and after having listened attentively to the report of Premier Herriot on the proceedings and results of the conference, gave its unqualified approval of the accords which had been concluded at the lengthy meeting at

the British capital. It was decided that the Premier should read his declaration before the Senate and Chamber on Thursday, giving a report of the work of the London conference to both bodies of the French legislature.

Opposition Expected.

M. Herriot will be faced with a in Parliament, where already eight important interpellations are scheduled in the Chamber of Deputies. In the Upper House former Premier Polncare is to take the floor against the Government. Neither house, however, is expected to go to the extent of voting disapproval of the Premier's course. The debate concluded, Parliament will probably adjourn until October.

German Cabinet Approves. Berlin, Aug. 19-It is generally expected that the Reichstag will meet Friday and that its decision on the results of the London reparation conference will be taken at the end of next

Yesterday's meeting of the Cabinet, under the chairmanship of President Ebert, unanimously approved the German delegation's attitude during the London negotiations, and the Govern-ment is determined to dissolve the Reichstag in the event of the latter failing to sanction the London pact. Marx Lauds Herriot.

The Government's policy in this regard was made clear to the leaders of the Reichstag parties in discussions after the Cabinet meeting, when Chancellor Marx laid before them the results of the London parleys. He emphasized that from his personal interviews with M. Herriot in London he believed that the French Premier had the best intentions and could be trusted; also that his chief alm was the pacification of Europe.
