**Eber Wins From Smith.**  
Hamilton, Ont., May 16.—Bobby Eber, bantamweight champion of Canada, received the judge's decision over Midget Smith of New York in a ten-round bout here last night. Eber's left kept Smith at a distance throughout the greater part of the fight. In the last three rounds Smith tried hard to put over a knockout.

**F. Johnson and Fulton Banned.**  
New York, May 16.—Floyd Johnson, heavyweight boxer, knocked out by Jess Willard on last Saturday, and Fred Fulton, who lost on a foul to Jack Renault, Canadian heavyweight, on the same bill, and their managers, Charley Cook and Jimmy Johnston, have been suspended indefinitely by the New York Boxing Commission. The action was taken in conjunction with the suspension of the men by the Massachusetts Boxing Commission for the failure of Fulton and Johnston to box before the Arena A. C. of Boston on April 16 last. The suspensions, it was said, would remain in force in New York State until the ban against the boxers and their managers had been lifted in Massachusetts.

**Smith Defeats Khirin.**  
Jeg Smith, of Bayonne, N. J., defeated Harry Khirin of Akron, Ohio, in Halifax last night scoring a technical knockout in the sixth round. He was down for the second time when his seconds threw a towel into the ring.

**Signed to Box.**  
New York, May 15.—Luis Firpo, of the Argentine, and Jess Willard, former world's heavyweight champion, today signed articles to box in a match to be held in the vicinity of New York not later than July 7, according to an announcement by Tex Rickard, promoter. The winner of this contest will be matched against Jack Dempsey for the world's title.
