## POLICE RAID IN HALIFAX

Thirteen and Proprietor Alleged Gamblers Arrested

(Halifax Chronicle.)

About 11 o'clock last night Detective Kennedy, Special Officer Reyno, Police Sergeant Mehan and Officers Conrod, Horne, Phalen and Elford raided the gambling establishment of David Treen over the Criterion Cafe in Sackville street, and captured thirteen alleged gamblers, beside the proprietor. For some time the police have been suspicious of the habits of the flat above the restaurant.

Last night, when the officers had taken their stations to prevent the escape of any one in the place, Detective Kennedy and his assistant climbed up the stairs leading to the gaming room. While they hesitated for an instant outside the door, behind which they could hear the remarks of the players, a man came out. As he opened the door, Detective Kennedy slipped into the room.

"Everybody sit right where they are!" said the detective, and so great was the astonishment of the men that they made no move to escape, but remained in their places until the policemen on the stairs were able to come into the room.

The patrol wagon and an automobile were summoned, and the prisoners, numbering fourteen, were taken to the police station, where they remained for the night.

Last night Detective Kennedy said that the department was determined to stamp out gambling in Halifax. The greater number of the prisoners taken were foreigners from Montreal and the upper provinces. The proprietor, Treen, was fined \$200 about six weeks ago for running a gambling joint.

## PLACE LUMBER INDUSTRY UNDER COMPENSATION BOARD JURISDICTION; PROCEEDINGS IN LEGISLATURE

Fredericton, N. B., April 11—An announcement that negotiations are in progress for bringing the lumber industry under the jurisdiction of the Workmen's Compensation Board was made in the legislature this evening. As this is the largest industry in the province and one attended by considerable hazard such a step would have the effect of greatly increasing the volume and the importance of the work of the board. The matter has been under discussion between the board and the lumbermen, and it is probable that the industry will be included either by voluntary action of the lumbermen or by order-in-council.

The premier replied to an insinuation by Mr. Tilley with a vigorous statement that the present administration does not stand in fear of the lumbermen or any other class or group.

The house completed consideration of the estimates this afternoon, thus making an important step towards prorogation. The supplementary estimates will be brought down next Tuesday. Among the items passed today was an amount of \$15,000 for the purpose of establishing disabled soldiers on free land suitable for truck farms or other forms of light cultivation. This action is the first taken by any provincial government to provide special concessions for soldiers whose disabilities incurred in the war would make it impossible for them to undertake farming in the usual way along the lines provided for able-bodied veterans.

Mr. Tilley took exception to the appointment of royal commissioners to investigate charges against members of the house, when the item to provide for the balance of expenses on this account and other matters came up. He suggested that such work could be done just as well with less expense by a committee of five members. The premier reminded him that a previous government had spent \$18,000 in one year for investigation commissions.

Fair notice was given today by Mr. Veniot that he intended to fight the Nashua Pulp and Paper Company's bill when it comes up in committee. The section which was particularly objectionable to him as minister of public works was that giving the company exclusive powers in connection with the use of highways and streets. He said he hoped that the members would back him up and Mr. Pinder, who had introduced the bill, cheerfully answered, "Sure."

Hon. Mr. Robinson introduced a bill to amend the act providing for the early closing of shops. He explained that the principal amendment proposed to change the vote of the city or town council from three-quarters to two-thirds. The change was being made in compliance with the request of a delegation.

Hon. Mr. Tweeddale introduced a bill to incorporate the New Brunswick Fruit Growers' Association. He explained that the organization had been in existence for some time and wished to become incorporated.

Hon. Mr. Veniot gave notice that he would on Tuesday next move for the suspension of Rule 77 to permit of the introduction of a bill in amendment of the act incorporating the New Brunswick Trust Company.

Mr. Tilley, pursuant to notice, had Rule 77 suspended for the introduction of a bill to incorporate the Hotham Sewerage Co., Ltd.

Mr. Grimmer moved for the suspension of Rules 77 and 78 to permit of the introduction of a bill to authorize the town of St. Stephen to issue debentures for street pavements.

The house then went into committee.

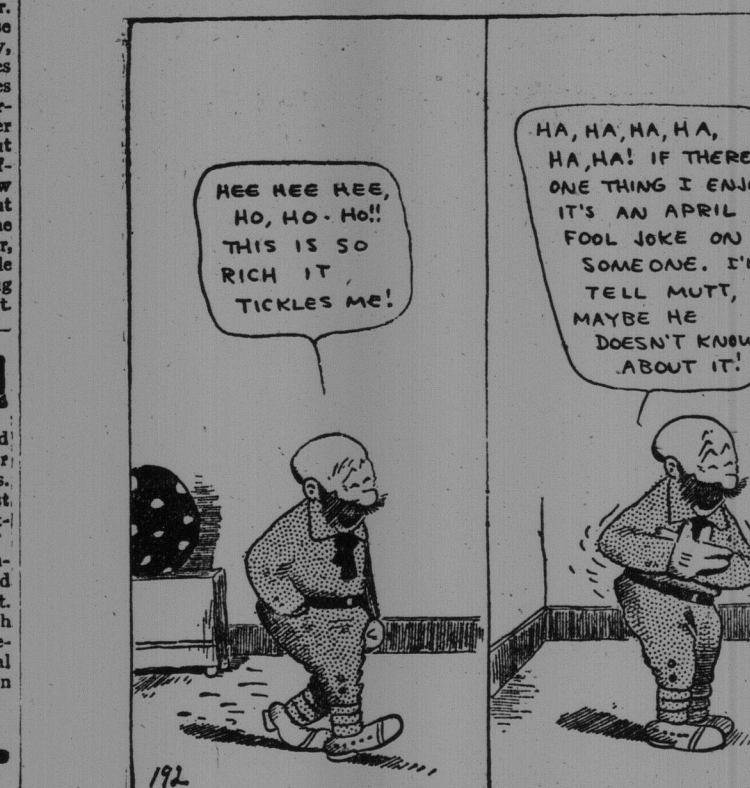

rather than to the city that the holders should look for redress.

**Rate Base.**

The city's investigation was conducted by Mr. Whiting who from the company's own books found the cost to be \$1,700,000. The only addition the company's counsel was able to suggest brought the total up to \$1,850,000 and the city accepted that figure. If it should be more, it was the duty of the company to show it. The Currier commission fixed a rate base of \$2,800,000, but did not give any explanation of how they arrived at that figure, although that was what they were paid for.

In reply to an enquiry as to how this was arrived at, Henry Holgate, one of the commissioners, had written that it included \$2,338,000 for physical valuation and the balance for overhead, interest contingencies, etc.

The rate base fixed by the commission could have been arrived at by taking the security issues into consideration. It would look as if the commission had figured out the amount required to pay seven per cent on the outstanding securities. It would have been too miraculous if the coincidence had occurred otherwise.

The seven per cent rate was not the ultimate rate permitted by the Currier bill. As the cost of operation was reduced the rate would increase. For every dollar which may be taken off the cost of coal, a proportionate amount would be added to the seven per cent rate.

He had shown that the money invested was the proper rate base, that this should be secured from the books, that it was not more than \$1,850,000, and that the return on this should be \$126,000.

The city was doing nothing creditable in appealing from the judgment which they believed to be erroneous. He suggested that the committee fix a day to hear Mr. Whiting or Mr. Meldrum.

Mr. Taylor said that the company's power rates were the lowest in New Brunswick and that the common stock did represent tangible value.

The transfer had been made because the St. John Railway Company could not raise money for development and the more elastic method of the Power Company was needed. Hydro development had been hindered by the war, but if the Currier bill was passed he believed that hydro-electric development would be undertaken within a year. When completed that would result in lower rates. On every dollar saved in the cost of operation the public got nine-tenths and the company one-tenth of the saving. The only change he would suggest in the Currier bill was that the rate should be eight instead of seven per cent, as this would greatly assist the company in securing new capital.
