FREDERICKSON MAN WINS DISTINCTION

Dr. J. W. Inches, born and bred in Fredericton, son of the late Andrew Inches, is now known as Captain James W. Inches, of the medical reserve corps, otherwise Dr. Inches, health commissioner of Detroit. It was his privilege, recently, to do the "wing turn" and a "tail spin" after ascending about 6,500 feet "somewhere above Michigan" in the fast army biplane. He flew about fifty miles with a lieutenant in the aviation corps.

In writing to a friend in Fredericton of his experience he says:—"It was my first trip aloft, and I enjoyed it thoroughly, except when the aviator stopped the engine to talk to me and tell me we were a mile up. I can't describe that sinking feeling."

He describes his return to earth, in airplanes, as delightful like riding on a pivot. He also writes that he is going

up again soon, when he expects to have the thrills of looping the loop.

Dr. Inches since the war started has been entrusted with important missions across seas. He was commissioned by President Wilson, on America's entry into the war, to go to France to give his advice and benefit of his experience in health matters to American officers in preparing cantonments there.

He was also sent across seas on matters connected with Red Cross, and it is learned, through Red Cross circles, that his work for that organization was highly commended on.

It is learned that he is now busily engaged on a crusade in Detroit that looks to the betterment of that city.

Private Dever was a native of Donegal, but emigrated to Boston, spent ten years there, came to St. John for a year and was married here to Miss Alice Williams of Brussels street. They returned to Boston, and last year he enlisted in the 226th battalion and went overseas, his wife returning to St. John. Besides his wife he is survived by his father and mother and three sisters in Donegal, two brothers in France and two in Boston, one of the latter being his twin-brother. He had made a great many warm friends during his residence in Boston, whose sympathy they go out to the bereaved family.
