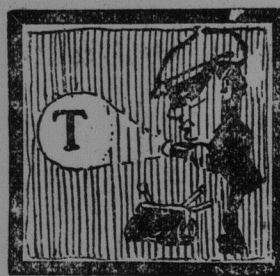

PT. PATRICK DEVER
KILLED IN ACTION



On Friday last Mrs. Patrick Dever of 311 Brussels street received a letter from her husband, Private Patrick Dever, in France, saying he hoped he would soon be able to return to his young wife. On Monday she received the terrible news that he had been killed in action. Many friends in his native Donegal, in Boston and St. John will hear the news with sincere sorrow.

Private Dever was a native of Donegal, but emigrated to Boston, spent ten years there, came to St. John for a year and was married here to Miss Alice Williams of Brussels street. They removed to Boston, and last year he enlisted in the 236th battalion and went overseas, his wife returning to St. John. Besides his wife he is survived by his father and mother and three sisters in Donegal, two brothers in France and two in Boston, one of the latter being his twin-brother. He had made a great many warm friends during his residence in Boston, whose sympathy will go out to the bereaved family.

FREDERICTON MAN WINS DISTINCTION

ALLIED ARMEN AGAIN OVER CONSTANTINOPLE

Constantinople, via London, Aug. 28.—An official communication issued today says: "Enemy airmen again attacked Constantinople Sunday night. Our barrage prevented them from flying over the city, but some bombs were dropped in the suburbs. No damage was done."

A despatch from Constantinople by way of Amsterdam received Sunday said two hostile air squadrons attacked Constantinople the previous Wednesday night.

Pickard, Sackville, and Mrs. Langstroth, Sussex, were sisters of deceased. Heber S. Keith, of St. John, is a nephew.

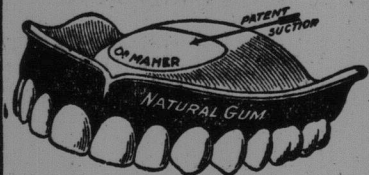

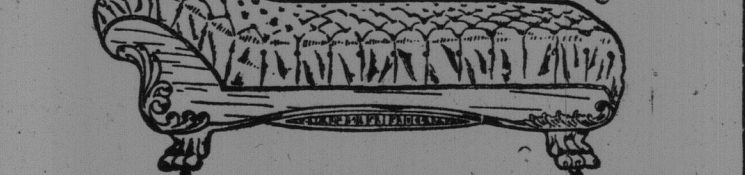

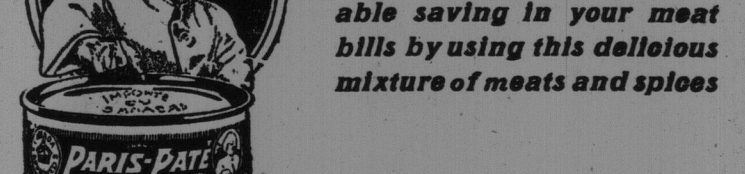
