Dearie: Yes, I believe men all recog-
nize a "made" complexion. Throw
away your powder and rouge and use a
plain supramax lotion. These you will

Do: You can make your eyes
sparkling and clear by this simple home
treatment. Dissolve an ounce of crystals
from the drug store in one-half pint of
water. One drop in each eye every day
will be all that is necessary to make
them feel strong and look bright. If the
lids are red or inflamed, try soaking
dabs of absorbent cotton in the tonic and
laying them on each eye.

Junia: The sagging of skin which
you write about is disagreeing and you
will be soon wrinkled past help if you
neglect it. But try this simple treat-

Mix an ounce of almond (from the
drug store) in one-half pint cold water
and add two teaspoonfuls glycerine. This
cream jelly will cause the skin to con-

clear and free from blemishes. Also re-
moves blackheads.

Eugenie: Your yellowish doublets
means that your liver requires a regu-
lar and I would suggest a plain kar-

in a healthy condition you will be free
from the bilious attacks, the obstinate
headaches, and the pains in small of

cupful of sugar and hot water to make
the dose is a tablespoonful before
meals. The kardine tonic is ex-

Chloe: I have found the most ben-
eficial shampoo for the scalp and hair

put one ounce quinine (which I get
from the druggist's), then add one-half
pint water and one ounce of lemon juice.
I have found it very soothing and it
banishes the dry, harsh, unhealthy con-
dition of the scalp, invigorating the hair-
roots so a beautiful growth is certain
to result.
