of the Huntley Street Bridge, Toronto,
100 feet above the ground.

GERMANY FIRST WITH AIRSHIP

Germany's progress in the realm of
military airship is set forth by Fritz
Leberecht in his new book, Aerial Cruises
in Peace and War.
His book supplies graphic evidence of
the steady progress that Germany has
made in securing herself of a foremost
place in air navigation. He participated
in the recent 30-hour, thousand mile
trip of the new Zeppelin naval airship
from South Germany across the North
sea and Baltic to Berlin—the mysterious
flight which gave rise to the belief that
the German airship had been prowling
around over Sheerness in the night of Oc-
tober 14.
Herr Leberecht tells of successful experi-
ments, recently carried out at Count Zepp-
lin's dockyards with explosives, which
prove that a Zeppelin airship can easily
carry and discharge nearly a ton of dy-
namite on a hostile warship dockyard, rail-
way line, or government base.
The newest type of Zeppelin, he asserts
will be able to remain aloft four days, and
will have an action considerably greater
than 1,500 miles, which the present type
can negotiate with ease.
Herr Leberecht pleads eloquently for the
passage of an aerial fleet law on the basis
of Germany's naval programme, whereby
12 Zeppelins should be laid down at once
and substitutes and additions be made at
regular intervals, as is done with the
navy.
The book is attracting wide attention in
Germany and is certain to stimulate the
interest of the Reichstag, which will soon
be called upon to pass an aerial fleet bill.
It was announced recently that the na-
tional subscription for the promotion of
military airship now exceeds \$1,625,000
which is almost double the amount raised
by the French people.
Half the amount will be devoted to the
purchase of aeroplanes for the army and
