**SAID HE WAS IN FINES AGAINST
GIBBONS SHED JUST THREE PLAYERS
BEFORE THE FIRE OF CAPITAL TEAM**

Police Say That Youth Arrested Also Admitted Setting McMillan Fire and Ringing in False Alarm

A youth giving his name as James Morash, appeared in the police court this morning to answer a charge of wandering about in Mill street last night and not being able to give a satisfactory account of setting fire to a barn owned by Mr. McMillan in Douglas avenue and ringing in a false alarm from Box 139 on the night of June 9.

Policeman Rankine said: "After Policeman Totten and myself arrested the prisoner, Rankine, Totten asked the defendant if he knew who set the fire in McMillan's barn. The policeman asked him if it was not he who set the fire and the prisoner replied that it was. "I asked him if it was he who rang in the false alarm from Box 139 on the night of June 9 and he admitted that he did. He also said he was in Gibbons' shed between 6 and 7 last night and afterwards."

Policeman Totten corroborated the previous witness' testimony, and the case was adjourned until Monday morning at 11 o'clock.

The defendant admitted that he had said these things to the policeman.

Canley, Sullivan and Lynch Fined by Umpire - In Police Court Canley is Fined \$20 - Timely Words From Bench

Reports regarding the conduct of Fredericton players in yesterday's game between the Marathons and Fredericton on the St. John grounds have been submitted by Umpire McCann to D. B. Donald, secretary of the New Brunswick & Maine Baseball League, penalizing three Fredericton players as follows:

Captain Robert Canley, fined \$10 and suspended for language used and for assaulting the umpire, the length of the suspension to be determined by the president of the league.

Sullivan, first base, fined \$5 for discoloring the ball and \$5 for throwing dust in the umpire's face.

Flynn, pitcher, fined \$5 for discoloring the ball.

The same teams will meet again this afternoon at three o'clock on the Marathons grounds. Farrell of Detroit will pitch for the locals and Hugh Pinkerton, who is due on the noon train, will be at second base instead of Nolan. Canley will not be with the visitors on account of his suspension.

Those lovers in this city, who are quite willing to support clean baseball will look forward to a game in which there should be no repetition of yesterday's exhibition. It will be the general desire of the fans, to see the penalties which have been imposed by the umpire strictly enforced instead of allowing them to stand as was the case last year. Unless the players are taught to respect the umpire and the spectators the effect of the rowdy tactics will be disastrous to the success of the league.

Canley's Case in Police Court

The news of the arrest of "Bob" Canley, the player-manager of the Fredericton base ball team, brought a great crowd of base ball players and enthusiasts to the police court, this morning to watch the proceedings before Magistrate Ritchie. The charge was assaulting Umpire Frank McCann during the course of the game on the Marathons grounds. Through his counsel, F. A. Guthrie, of Fredericton, the defendant pleaded guilty.

Umpire McCann told the magistrate that since the affair he and the defendant had talked the matter over and he said that he did not wish to press the charge.

The magistrate said: "I have no sympathy with a man who will use his feet to another and I think it is a disgrace to the great game in which you men participate that one of you should be guilty of such a mean trick, and I trust that I will never again hear of such an occurrence as took place yesterday. If I were not so busy as I am, I would call for a preliminary examination and the case would go to the supreme court and if the defendant were found guilty he would be liable to two years in Dorechester."

However, on account of the complainant appearing here this morning, after considering the matter, I will not be so harsh as I first intended, but the decision I intend to hand out must not be taken as a precedent and if we have another case of this kind again I do not want the defendant to say that I did so and so in this case. I will therefore fine the defendant \$20 or two months in jail."

The magistrate then exhorted all the players to strive to keep the sport clean and live up to the rules of the game and impressed on them the seriousness of the offence with which one of their profession was charged.

Mr. Guthrie asked the court if it would not be possible on account of the defendant's previous good record in the sixteen years he had been in the game, to allow the fine to stand over him, as he thought that this would prove as effective as if he were asked to pay the fine.

The magistrate, however, would not do this and the fine was paid.






