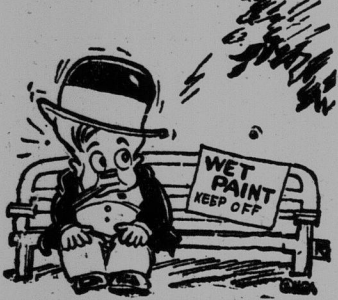
Fables On Health

SMALL CUTS ARE DANGEROUS

At this season of the year many children shed their shoes. Playing in the streets, alleys or yards there is constant danger of cuts from glass, tin, old pieces of metal, or of having their feet pierced by rusty nails. Many mothers do not realize the danger that lies in small cuts. Blood poisoning may result from a very slight wound. Hundreds of deaths occur every year because of carelessness in the care of a slight cut. If the wound has been made by a nail or a splinter, be sure the piercing object is removed. Do not touch the wound with unclean hands. And do not permit unclean cloths to touch it. Open the wound with a knife, and permit it to bleed freely, and then saturate it with a solution of carbolic acid, one teaspoonful to a pint of water. Peroxide of hydrogen or iodine is good.

Doctor Bill brought out a bottle marked 'Flamingo Oil.' "This will cure you," he said kindly. To Be Continued.

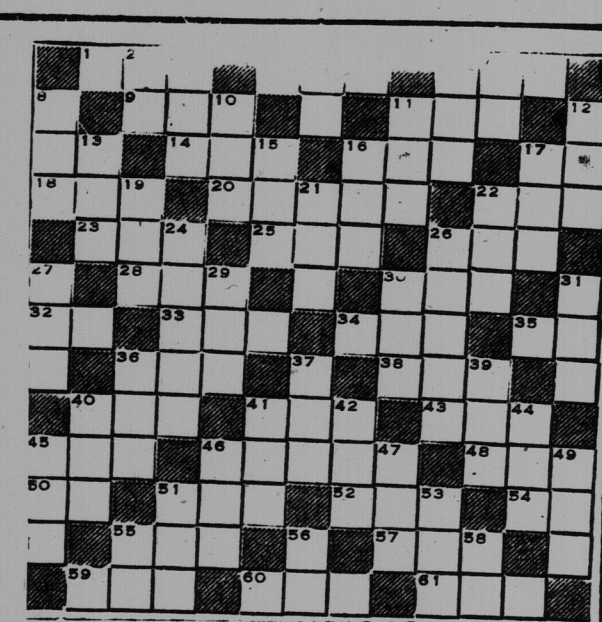

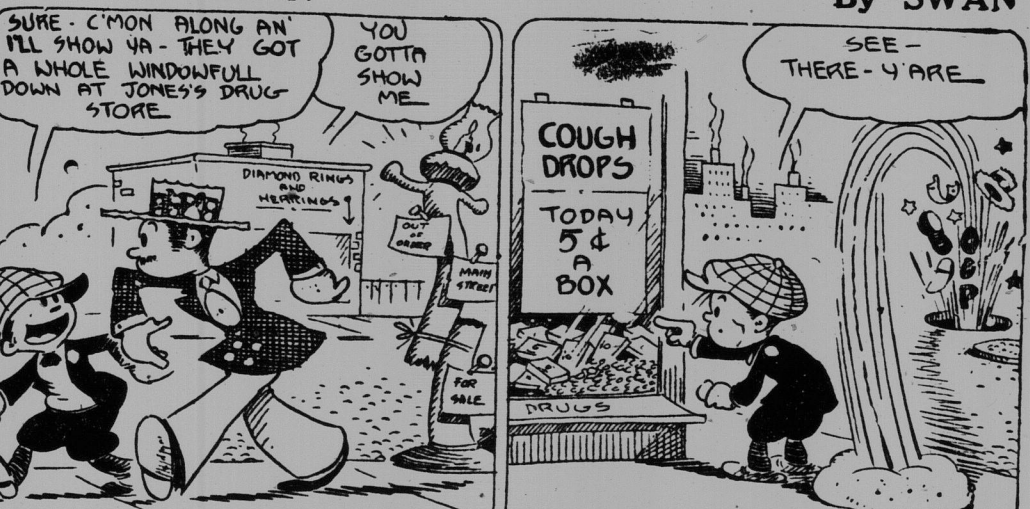

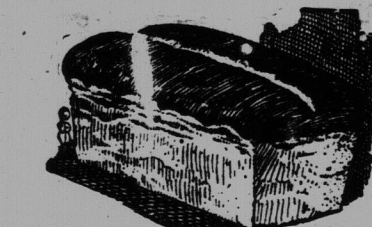
