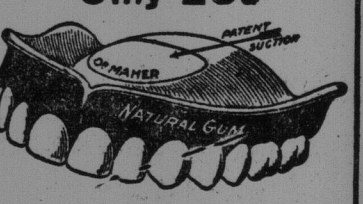

Canadian Lines
Ready for Peace

Railway War Board Says New
Equipment Assures Adequate
Facilities for the New Era

Montreal, Nov. 20.—That the railways of Canada are in good condition and ready for the coming of peace is the substance of a statement issued by the Canadian Railway War Board, after a long session held in Montreal, presided over by Lord Shaughnessy, who will continue as chairman, presiding over Canada's entire railway system.

"Thanks to the foresight of the Canadian Government in ordering engines built at a time when some of the roads in Canada were unable to finance and purchase, the power situation on the Canadian roads is now fairly satisfactory," the statement says. "Two hundred new engines are now in service on the Canadian Northern, Grand Trunk and Canadian Government lines. The scarcity of locomotives which was on the verge of becoming acute last winter, is now greatly modified."

"The supply of freight cars has been increased by 14,000 new cars bought by the government for their roads. These new cars, added to the better loading methods obtained through the Canadian Railway War Board's efforts, mitigate the danger of congestion."

"Last winter over 20,000 of our cars were lost in the American traffic tie-up. It is hoped that this winter the American lines will be able to return our cars almost as fast as they get them. There is more 'track-room' this year, although the traffic handled has been heavier than ever. The board was successful in getting several heavy movements, such as the fuel and pulpwood movements, well out of the way during the summer months, when traffic is light. This clears the road for essential winter traffic and the unusually heavy movement of wheat by rail during the coming winter."

"Out of the 100,000 tons of new rails finally allotted us, 80,000 have been received, and these have been used to good advantage on the main lines. The labor situation is satisfactory except in so far as the roads are still understaffed. A special labor board formed at the request of the Canadian Railway War Board, with the co-operation of the brotherhoods, is administering the McAdoo award very satisfactorily."

"The temporary isolation of the Drumheller coal fields by railway break-down last winter, and the consequent fuel shortage in certain prairie districts, will almost certainly not happen this winter, as the vital section of line has been double tracked. The board has made working plans for Canadian Northern, Canadian Pacific and Grand Trunk Pacific to co-operate in carrying traffic in the west, should any one road find itself overburdened. Plans are being perfected for further unification of terminal and other facilities. We have reason to believe that the railway system of Canada is in more nearly perfect position to face peace conditions and the reconstruction period than any in the world."

THE BAND'S FAIR
The City Cornet Band fair in St. Andrew's rink is daily becoming more popular. Last evening the spacious hall was taxed almost to capacity, the games were liberally patronized and a stellar programme rendered by the Depot Battalion Band was thoroughly enjoyed. The programme rendered by the juvenile band was as usual good, and the little choirs were given hearty and prolonged applause. From the present outlook the fair will be very successful.

MORNING NEWS
OVER THE WIRES

The Berlin soldiers' and workmen's council has passed a resolution against the summoning of a constituent assembly, and demanding the summoning of a general soldiers' and workmen's congress. "In order to take a decision as to the future of Germany."

The French government will confer the Grand Cross of the Legion of Honor on Queen Elizabeth of Belgium. Prince Leopold, heir apparent to the throne of Belgium, will be awarded the War Cross and the Grand Cross of the Legion of Honor.

Scores of telegrams congratulating Sir Wilfrid Laurier on his 77th birthday were received by the Liberal leader yesterday.

Leut. Ellsworth Gaskell was turned to death and Hobson Tupper was seriously injured yesterday near Trenton (N. J.), when their airplane caught fire and plunged to earth.

U. S. Ambassador Francis has arrived in Scotland from Archangel. He will take a brief vacation and return soon to Russia.

King Albert made his entry into Antwerp today. His progress into and about the city was enthusiastically cheered everywhere.

British merchant tonnage losses in October totalled \$4,000 tons gross, which is less than in any month since May, 1916. Allied and neutral losses combined amounted to \$6,000 tons.

It is reported that several hundred persons have been arrested in Vienna on charges of conspiring with the Red Guards to proclaim a Bolshevik government.

GETTING READY FOR SESSION AT OTTAWA
Ottawa, Nov. 20.—Preliminary steps have been taken for the calling of parliament. It is not expected, however, that members will actually be summoned to Ottawa before January.

Airplane Industry
For St. John Planned

There is a movement on foot for establishing an airplane industry in St. John within a few months. A company has been formed and Stanley R. Elkin, M. P., E. A. Schofield and Major S. S. Wetmore are directors of the new company with another director to be named. Captain Hay, formerly of headquarters staff, and a returned officer of the Royal Flying Corps, is the technical expert. Captain J. R. Miller is secretary and J. Roy Campbell solicitor. The intention is to establish a transportation company with headquarters in St. John. The company have been successful in buying the rights of the Avro Company, Ltd., of London. The new company here will be a subsidiary one to this famous company. A trip could be made from St. John to Halifax in an hour and a half; to Montreal in a few hours and to New York in between four and five hours. A transportation system between the maritime provinces and Upper Canada and extending to the cities in the United States is proposed.

BANDITS TERRORIZE WESTERN COMMUNITY HAVE MURDERED TWO
Charles Horsley, a soldier, while attempting to enter a dug-out at Steep Creek, Prince Albert, Sask., was shot by members of the Gervas gang of bandits. The unfortunate man was a member of a posse hunting for bandits who were accused of murdering James McKay. People of that neighborhood have been terrorized by three men, one of whom is alleged to be Doctor Gervas. A boy witnessed the shooting and gave information to the authorities and Dr. Joseph Gervas has been apprehended. The other two who are alleged to have killed McKay are still at large.
