firm is opened the chance of supplying not
only to the Japanese government, but to
many private parties in the flower kingdom
all the machinery which it is expected will
be in pretty general use in that country in
the very short time.

learned the machine business in Roddick's
Miramichi Foundry & Machine Works. His

Mr. Henderson, convener of the Presby-
tery's H. M. committee submitted the re-
ports of the outlook for the past half year.
These reports were very satisfactory, show-
ing evidence of much faithful work done,
and an advance in the liberality of the
people in our mission field. The matter of
supply for the winter months was left in the
hands of the committee.

It was also reported that grants had been
secured from the H. M. Board for the
ordained missionary charges of Harcourt and
Millerton for the current half year.

Mr. Thorpe was appointed to supply
Bathurst, and Mr. Quinn to continue his
work at Metapedia until the March meeting
of Presbytery.

Mr. MacLean was appointed convener of
the committee on Young People's Societies,
in place of Mr. Calder.

A resolution was passed, recommending
all the S. Schools of the Presbytery to use
the Assembly's series of Home Study Lesson
Leaflets, and the illustrated papers soon to
be issued.

The recommendation sent Presbyterial
visitation of schools was remitted to the
Presbytery's S. S. committee with instruc-
tions to report on the subject.

Mr. Carr, sub-seg of the century fund,
submitted the following resolutions which
were carefully considered and unanimously
adopted:

The Presbytery of Miramichi cordially
endorses the action of the General Assembly
and the Synod of the Maritime Provinces to
appeal to the church to raise a century fund
of one million dollars by the end of May
1901, as a thank-offering for the blessings of
the century about to end, and as a timely
preparation for meeting our increased
needs, and as a means of securing the sym-
pathy and support of our congregations
and all organizations connected therewith.

Resolved further, that in order to pro-
mote the work with thoroughness and effi-
ciency, the congregations in the Presbytery
be divided into six groups, the ministers of
each group to be a committee to make such
arrangements as they may deem best for
successfully carrying on the work.

Resolved further, that the groups be as
follows: Group I, New Carlisle, New Rich-
mond and Eccumenae, Rev. J. F. McFarlane,
convener; Group II, Metapedia, Camp-
bellton, Dalhousie, New Mills and Bathurst,
Rev. George Fisher, convener; Group III,
Newcastle, Dalhousie, and Chatham, Rev.
W. Aiken, convener; Group IV, Blackville,
Upper Miramichi, Redbank, Mil-
erton and St. Andrew's, Chatham, Rev. D.
Henderson, convener; Group V, St. John's,
Chatham, Logville and Black River, Rev.
J. M. MacLean, convener; Group VI, Har-
court, Bathurst, Kingston and Kouchibou-
guette, Rev. D. H. Carr, convener.

Resolved, that each minister of the Pres-
bytery be requested to bring to his congre-
gation the matter of the century fund, and
endeavor to secure their sympathy and
support, some time before the visitation by
the committee.

Resolved further, that the committee be
requested to have the work as nearly com-
plete as possible before the next meeting of
the Presbytery.

The next regular meeting of the Pres-
bytery will be held in St. John's, Chatham,
Bathurst, on the last Tuesday in March.
