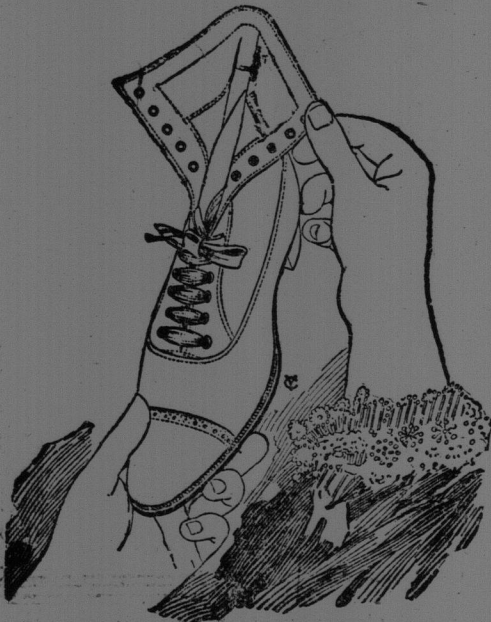

that is if a property holder paid \$50 or over he would be entitled to vote for all three; a non-property holder paying \$20 taxes would vote for two, while the smaller tax payer would vote for but one candidate. Pay these commissioners not less than seven thousand dollars each—remember if you want good men you must pay them a good salary—a cheap employee is expensive at any price—give these three men power to employ an A1 engineer; pay the engineer not less than four or five thousand dollars a year and turn the whole municipal affair over to them. I tell you it makes one heart sick to go away and find the flower of our city prospering in other places and their own town cannot support them, and unless something is done, some action taken quickly, many of our choicest young men who are with us now will very soon be numbered among the exiles. Can you blame that? No, rather commend them for having the grit to break away from friends and influence and make names for themselves. On the other hand it is up to the city to bring about conditions which will warrant these energetic young men staying here. It seems to me it is pretty nearly time something was done. The merchants of Winnipeg have banded together in an organization known as "The Winnipeg Development and Industrial Bureau." Their object is to impress upon everyone that Winnipeg offers better possibilities for investment of capital than any other city in the world. And the manufacturers are going to Winnipeg and yet Winnipeg has not got anything like the natural advantages for shipping and raw material that St. John can lay claim to. ON A MISSION OF MURDER

BOSTON, April 10.—News of the arrest in western Macedonia of a band of Mahometan Albanians, including the alleged slayer of Bishop Photias of Gorizia, was received in this city yesterday.

The despatch stated that the slayer of the bishop, Topoulis Ballo, had just arrived from Boston with a band of Albanians, and when arrested by the Macedonian authorities papers were found in their possession showing that they were sent by the bishop to the faction of the Boston Albanians to assassinate the present Greek bishop of Gorizia.

Ballo, the leader of the band, who has been travelling in America for the past ten months collecting funds for the Macedonian cause, arrived at Preveze about two weeks ago. He stopped with a number of his followers at a hotel and while intoxicated boasted, it is alleged, that he was the slayer of Bishop Photias. The entire party was taken into custody.

Bishop Photias was assassinated a year ago by a man who asked for his blessing and the assassin escaped.

While Ballo was here it is said he boasted at a meeting held at 178 Pleasant street that he had killed the bishop. The local Greeks attempted to have him extradited by the Turkish authorities, but failed. Ballo then went throughout New England collecting funds for an Albanian revolution.

Demosethanes B. Terzakis, editor of the Metanastis, the local Greek paper, said last evening that agents of the sultan were here to create factions among the young Albanians and to arouse the fanaticism of the Mohammedan Albanians against Christians in Macedonia, and he believes the men arrested yesterday are in the employ of the Turkish government.

According to a prominent Greek manufacturer of this city, the Macedonian Philhellenic committee of Boston knew of the departure of the band, as the latter made no attempt to keep their affairs secret. This manufacturer claims that the Russian government is also trying to create an anti-Hellenic sentiment among the 20,000 Christian Albanians in New England.

ROUMANIA EXPELS TEN THOUSAND JEWS

BERLIN, April 10.—Information has been received here that the Roumanian government has initiated a most rigorous persecution of the Jews, thereby violating Article 41 of the Berlin treaty of 1878.

Local authorities in Roumania have received instructions to expel thousands of Jews from districts in which they have resided for many years, even for generations.

The expelled Jews are reduced to destitution. Their total number approximates 10,000. The Tageblatt urges that the signatory powers to the Berlin treaty should intervene and compel Roumania to treat the Jews decently. An outbreak of Jew-baiting is reported from Jaffa, Palestine, where Turkish soldiers, police and a mob of Moslem fanatics attacked the ghetto, wounding thirteen of the inhabitants.

ELOPING COUPLE CAUGHT

BY HUSBAND'S RUSE

Invited to Dine With Him But Were Taken in Charge by the Police.

FLORENCE, April 10.—On January 23 last Signora Piccini fled from her conjugal roof in company with a young Florentine doctor. The lady, who is 27 years of age, is the wife of Signor Adolfo Piccini, a cloth merchant. During a long illness she has been assiduously attended by Doctor Castellani. When she was cured her feelings of gratitude developed into something akin to love, which led the ill-advised lady to forget her duties and to elope with her erstwhile physician. The husband learned that the guilty pair had escaped to Genoa, proceeded thence to Nice, and finally landed in Paris. A few days ago, they returned to Florence and put up at a hotel.

ta reached the "witch's" hut to late. The woman, however, had prophesied Carlotta's recovery when she reached the "witch's" age, and this, the villagers say, occurred last week. At any rate, Carlotta's parents spent their substance in seeking a cure from seidrists.

Carlotta's first words, spoken to her sister-in-law, who woke her in the morning were "Come, come and dress me." News of the "miracle" spreading the villagers flocked to the house, whereupon Carlotta rated them and told them to be off. She is a cheery healthy woman but very shy.

She remembers very little of her past save in the case of a few incidents which caused her violent emotion. One such incident was a proposal of marriage from a hunchback. She told how she tried to show her indignation by gestures.

Yesterday she went in procession to the village church with numberless relatives, and confessed vocally for the first time in her life. Previously she had written her confessions.
