FIGHTING LASTED FOR FOURTEEN HOURS.

Russians Driven From Ta Tche Kiao—Story of the Sinking of a British Vessel by Russian War Ships.

LONDON, July 26.—Cabling under date of July 24, the Daily Mail's New York correspondent describes a 14-hour desperate battle, with heavy losses on both sides, and which resulted in the Russian position at Tatchekiao being rendered untenable by reason of which they were compelled to retreat towards Hail Chens.

NEW YORK, July 25.—The Knight Commander, sunk by the Vladivostok squadron yesterday, according to the maritime register, is a British steamer of 2,716 tons burthen, commanded by Capt. Durant.

LONDON, July 25.—There is practically no excitement here over the sinking of the Knight Commander, the regular warship and within the zone of hostilities. The bitter criticism evoked over the action of the vessels of the Russian volunteer fleet and the passing of the Dardanelles is more or less disarmed.

WASHINGTON, July 25.—The week's investigation of the state department of the problem connected with the operations of belligerent ships against neutral merchantmen, has crystallized in a letter addressed to the Pacific Mail Steamship Co. The company recently wrote to the department expressing apprehension for the safety of the big Shawmut.

YOKOHAMA, July 25.—Capt. Brown of the str. Tsinan, which brought the crew of the str. Knight Commander in to port today, says that the Knight Commander met three Russian warships at 7.30 o'clock Saturday morning off the province of Iau.

TWO STRIKES.

Nothing Doing Around the Fall River Mills. All Employed in Packing Industry in Chicago Are Out, With Exception of Teamsters and Engineers.

FALL RIVER, Mass., July 25.—The end of the first day of the strike of 26,000 cotton mill operatives of this city, found little or no change in the situation. The day passed quietly and so did the evening, and so, in all probability, will the succeeding days of the strike for the reason that the opposition to the strike on the part of the operatives is so light as to be hardly noticeable.

PORT SAID, July 25.—The Hamburg-American line steamer Scandia, which was released yesterday by the Russians, has resumed her voyage. She entered the Suez canal this afternoon.

BERLIN, July 25.—A despatch to a news agency from Liao Yang reports heavy artillery fighting there all yesterday. The Russians' casualties, it is said, were about 1,000 men.
