

Chicago, Ill., June 1.—Frank Gotch, of Humboldt, Iowa, conight success-fully defended his title as wrestling champion of the world, by easily de-feating Stanilius Zbyszko, the Polish champion in straight falls, at the Col-iseum. Gotch outclassed his bulkler opponent in every department of the game, after winning the first fall in the phenominal time of six and one quarter seconds. 
