The Home Market. This speech has been built up by protection. Reciprocity would allow the American farmer to get into this market and also farmers of other countries which exported last year \$50,000,000 worth of farm products. And all this you give for the chance of getting into a market which you produce. You want to sell your butter in the U. S. but the U. S. is a great exporter of butter and so with all other farm products.

### MR. FOSTER IN FREDERICTON.

Fredericton, Aug. 28.—The city Opera House could not accommodate the people who wanted to hear Mr. Foster, formerly Minister of Finance, and at one time representative of York county in parliament, when he discussed the reciprocity question here tonight. Mr. Foster placed the stamp of disapproval upon the Laurier-Taft pact and predicted that the Laurier-Taft pact would be a disaster to the people of Canada should it be accepted.

### Forced on Canada.

What's the matter with Canada? Why was this thing forced on us? Why was the Laurier-Taft pact forced on us? Nothing of the sort. There never was greater protection in Canada, more progress and prosperity.

### Mr. Foster's speech.

Mr. Foster followed and discussed the reciprocity pact in a most convincing manner, taking up the question of the transportation of markets and other features of the question showing that ratification of the pact would destroy the Canadian home market. He received a grand reception.

### Opposition Candidate in Charlotte Addresses Large and Enthusiastic Gathering at Milltown—Hon. J. K. Fleming also Spoke.

Milltown, Aug. 28.—A large and enthusiastic assembly of the credit of the Conservative candidate in Charlotte county, speak of the reciprocity pact as a disaster to the people of Canada. The speaker, Mr. Purcell, a former Liberal, delivered an eloquent and patriotic address to the audience.

Brockville, Ont., Aug. 28.—Mr. R. Borden invaded Brockville tonight and addressed a large gathering of citizens and farmers who had come in from all parts of the rich agricultural district which surrounds the town. Four thousand people crowded into the skating rink where the leader of the opposition and other speakers addressed them.
