

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

The sole head of a family, or any male over it years old, may homestead a quarter-section or available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatche wan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency of the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency (but not Sub-Agency) on certain conditions.

Duttes — Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homestead can farm of at least So acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required excep where residence is performed in the vicinity. In certain districts a homestead re in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre.

Duttes — Six months residence in each of three years after earning h mestead patient, also So acres conditions.

A sottler who has exhausted his homestead a feeting, one carefulands.
