Common Council Met In Committee

**Commissioner Jones Tired
With Preparing Reports—
A Bill from G. G. Murdoch
in Connection With the
Timber Investigation Was
Referred Back for Further
Information.**

Commissioner Jones expressed himself as tired with preparing reports on the extension of the water service on the West Side, at the committee meeting of the common council held yesterday afternoon, when that matter was being informally discussed by the commissioners. No action was taken as Commissioner Thornton was absent he being employed in acting as host to a number of the police chiefs who were in the city.

A bill of G. G. Murdoch for \$2,076.79 in connection with the "timber" investigation caused quite a bit of discussion and was finally referred back for further information.

Commissioner Bullock asked for a vote of \$250 for the purpose of building an additional bathing house at Indiantown.

Mayor Schofield presided and Commissioners Bullock, Jones and Frink were present.

Commissioner Bullock presented a bill for \$270 from Eddy and Company for a shaft for ferry steamer Governor Carleton and recommended its payment. He also recommended that he be given authority to spend \$250 on the erection of an additional bathing house at Indiantown and in this connection spoke of the need of more dressing room accommodation and an assistant for Mark Burns, the efficient superintendent there. Both recommendations were adopted.

Commissioner Jones introduced a bill of \$2,076.79 from G. G. Murdoch for services in connection with the survey of the city's lands at Loch Lomond on which it was claimed timber had been illegally cut. Among the items were: \$120 for horse hire; \$455 for Mrs. Barker, board; \$524 for wages; \$26.39 for snowshoes and \$1,043.04 for his own services.

Some comment was made on the charge for searching titles, which for one month was charged at the rate of \$15 per day and for another month at \$16 per day. In commenting on this item Commissioner Jones expressed the opinion that practically all of the information could have been obtained from the records of the late William Murdoch which were on file at the office of water and sewerage department, and the expense of searching titles at the record office have been done away with.

On the suggestion of Mayor Schofield the bill was laid over for more detailed information.

Commissioner Jones announced his readiness to proceed with the discussion of the proposed water extension to Spruce Lake, but as Commissioner Thornton was absent it was decided to lay the matter over. Commissioner Frink wanted a little information in regard to how many people in Fairville were short of water. He admitted that the Lancaster residents had had been short of water for some time in this respect and wanted to know how they were to be supplied. If there was any provision in the project for a tank for the entertainment provided while in the city. Filed.

A communication regarding the city paying a share of the cost of maintaining an employment office in the city at an estimated cost of \$1,250 per year was referred to the mayor for further information as to the demand for such an office here. The cost year was estimated at \$5,000 of which the federal government would pay half and the provincial government and the city council the remaining half.

A communication from the Rotary Club protesting against the retention of a level crossing at the western end of Douglas Avenue was filed.

Mayor Schofield reported that the sum of \$784.44 had been spent in sending supplies to St. Quentin and \$250 had been collected toward the payment of the amount. The balance of \$534.44 was ordered paid.

Council then adjourned.
