In the matter of George L. Shipp, a supposed lunatic, the referee, E. H. MacPine, in his report, recommended the appointment of Mr. L. A. Curry, K. C., as guardian of the person and estate of George L. Shipp.

The case of the King vs. Connolly, O'Neil, Doherty and Daley was proceeded with before Judge Hanington on Tuesday. The case was a charge of assault on the day of the fight, and his deposition at the former trials were read.

DOMESTIC AND FOREIGN EVENTS BRIEFLY TOLD.

Despatches from Points of Interest in Different Parts of the World.

Winnipeg, Sept. 17.-Special-Sir Macdonald Dowell, who has been on an extended trip to the Yukon, reached here today on his way home.

Montreal, Sept. 17.-Special-The provincial synod of the Church of England today decided against establishing a new ecclesiastical province comprising the dioceses in Ontario.

Ottawa, Sept. 17.-Special-Carrie Ann lectured to about 200 people in Arden Hall here tonight. It was a failure. She visited a couple of saloons previous to the lecture and smashed a couple of cheap mirrors so as to advertise her meeting.

Toronto, Sept. 17.-Special-The Ontario government today said by auction 400 square miles of pine timber limits in Algoma and Thunder Bay districts. The bidding was brisk. The amount realized was \$762,787, or an average of \$1,833, per square mile. The result of the sale is regarded as eminently satisfactory as some of the limits had been partially burnt over and prices obtained on the whole were considerably in advance of the last sale in 1899.

A ban has been placed upon swearing parties in Washington, D. C. The authorities have adopted the following regulations as a result of numerous complaints about profane drunks: "No person shall own or keep, within the district of Columbia, any fowl, parrot, or bird, which by offensive cawing, cackling, talking or singing, or in any other manner shall disturb the comfort and quiet of any neighborhood."

Brookton, Mass., Sept. 15.-A switch not properly set brought a passenger express and a heavy freight train together with the result of six passengers on the express train and injuries to 25 others, this afternoon, on the main line of the N. Y. & H. R. railroad, near Boston. The express left Boston at 1:08 p. m. and was running 10 miles an hour at the time of the accident.
