"I had struggled aboard a life-raft, and about five minutes later we picked up Lady Allan, who had been battling bravely to keep afloat and was now ready to give up. We hauled her aboard and laid her down in the centre of the raft. She remained there in a semi-conscious condition after we picked her up. What became of her two

daughters I do not know. "I shall never forget those two hours of drifting. At times we were surrounded by bodies of the dead, and always we could hear the dying shrieks of men and women in the water. We passed the bodies of several babies. "In spite of the tragic situation those on board the raft joined in
