### Soviet Science

Last Wednesday evening a very enjoyable time was spent in the Math lecture room where several films about the Soviet sciences were

short speech given by Mr. Balch of the Entomology department here in Fredericton. He spoke of the advancement of science in the Soviet and its contributions to numanity

since the Russian revolution. The films bogan with a series of subjects that dealt with a new method of producing liquid oxygen, showing how the modern rifle is more accurate and powerful than its predecessor. The second film dealt with a miscellaneous group of subjects ranging from agriculture to steel structures.

The third film, which was more or less the main topic of the evening was concerned with the reviving of animals after they had been dead for a certain length of time.
