Dr. Colin B. Mackay, president of UNB, appeared before the Fredericton City Council Tuesday with a request for a grant of \$400,000 from the city.

This money, to be used for construction of a new residence, would consist of annual \$20,000 grants over a 20-year period. The new building would be named Fredericton House and would form part of the quad-rangle in which Aitken and Neville House stand.

Dr. Mackay stated that during the present academic year the more than 2000 people at work "up the hill" and the university itself would spend \$2,845,000 in Fredericton.

The request was turned over to the finance committee for examination and recommendation.
