Brent MacPherson, a member of the Learning Disability Association of Canada, has formed an Adult support Group for people with learning disabilities. Considering the fact that 10% or more of the population has some form of learning disability, one would think that it would be relatively easy to have an assessment test done. For university students, at least, this is not the case. It is a very costly and frustrating experience.

Those who have the courage to admit that they have a learning problem find it difficult to get help here on campus. Strangely, there are no funds allotted for handicapped services here on campus, and Brent MacPherson feels this is a big problem for students. Strangely, many people do not even realize that they may have a learning disability. These disabilities can show themselves in various ways, problems with memorization, spelling, reading, even organization.

Illiteracy is also a widely misunderstood problem. Students with learning disabilities often have not undergone a test of assessment, so they do not realize they have a problem. They are pushed slowly through the school system feeling extremely inadequate.

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Childcare Action Team discusses daycare

There will be daycare at U.N.B. but the question of when remains unanswered.

A meeting to discuss option of Daycare facility at U.N.B., was held last Friday at the Old Arts Building conference room; however, as Jamie Van Raalte, SU Vice-President for finance and administration, says, "not much was accomplished."

Van Raalte is heading the recently established Childcare Action Team.

"We (the committee) were really disappointed that more wasn't accomplished at the meeting. A few ideas on who should run the facility, and where it should be set up, were mentioned but basically we just bounced around the options. We were looking for a committment from the U.N.B. faculty and other committees," says Van Raalte. Another meeting will be held in two weeks for interested parties, but an exact date and time have not been set.

"We'll be trying to answer a number of questions such as where and what type of structure will be needed. And we'll have to decide whether the Day-Care should be run by the University or other independent bodies," states Van Raalte.

We're optimistic that the \$250,000 will be put to use in the near future.
