

which shall remain of record in the Prison, shewing the post occupied by every officer and servant during every hour of every day, and the order and time of night duty, taking care to apportion the weight of duty as equally as possible, among the officers, from day to day.

51. Under the orders of the Warden, he shall have special control and direction of the Trade Instructors, Keepers, Guards, and other servants of the Prison, and shall be responsible that every one performs his respective duties with intelligence, fidelity and zeal.

52. He shall call the Muster Roll every morning, at the opening of the Prison, before the Convicts go to work after dinner, in the evening after the closing of the Prison, and at such other times, as he may consider necessary, to see that all are present.

53. He shall see that the Arms and Accoutrements are at all times in the best of order, and ready for service.

54. He shall see that all the Officers of the Prison are supplied with Revolvers, and Guards on the walls and outside the Prison with breech-loading Rifles, in addition, and that they are practised at stated times in the use of their arms.

55. He shall report to the Warden the name of every officer, coming upon duty without being in uniform.

56. He shall enforce obedience to the Prison Rules and Regulations, and to all orders from time to time given by the Directors or the Warden, and shall maintain generally the police and discipline of the Prison, with the strictest exactness, for which purpose he shall frequently during the day visit the shops, yards, hospitals, kitchen, cells and other apartments of the Prison, and the different places where work is in hand, taking every precaution for the security of the Prison and prisoners, seeing that the officers are vigilant and attentive to their duties, and that they keep the prisoners under them diligently employed during their whole time. And it shall be his duty to report to the Warden, in writing, strictly and promptly, every neglect of duty or of impropriety or misconduct on the part of any officer.

57. He shall not permit any book, pamphlet, or newspaper to be read by any officer, nor to be in his possession, while on duty in or about the Prison.

58. When a convict is received into the Prison, the Deputy Warden shall take charge of him, and see that he is properly cleansed in a bath, clothed in a prison suit, and duly inspected by the Surgeon. He shall see that a description of everything found upon the convict is duly entered in the "Prisoners' Effects" Book, and how it is disposed of; and that the convict is brought before the Warden to be further dealt with. Should any money be found upon a convict, he shall hand it to the Warden after entry in the "Prisoners' Effects" Book.

59. He shall at short intervals examine the locks, levers and gratings of the dormitories, towers and cellars, and the locks and fastenings in every door. On every examination he shall report in writing their condition to the Warden.
