OTTAWA, 23rd. March 1914-

Sir:-

I beg to enclose Surrender, in Duplicate of the merchantable timber on the Weymentachingue Reserve, which you are hereby authorized to submit to the Indians under and in accordance with the provisions of the Indian Act.

The meeting of Indians should be summoned in accordance with the rules of the Band, - care being taken to see that all members get notice, and if the Indians are favourable to surrender, you should have the documents dated and the affidavit of execution thereof, made by yourself and a Chief and a principal man, before a Stipendiary Magistrate, or a Justice of the Peace, and then return both documents to the Department. When returning Surrender, if assented to, you should advise us to the number of male members of the Band, over 21 years of age, entitled to vote, the number of ^{Indians} ~~persons~~ at the meeting, the number voting for the surrender, and the number voting against.
