Crown Attorney Says Evidence Submitted Before Magistrate Neithe Accused - Wife Before Dying Said There Must Have Been Somethin In the Salts-Husband's Testimony.

The prisoner, Mrs. Susan Diamond, a little old woman with an impassive face, dressed in black, sat beside her counsel, Mr. Stewart Masson of Belleville and Mr. W. J. Moore of Madoc. Crown Attorney Anderson, at whose side was seated Inspector Murray, conducted the prosecution.

At 10 'clock Magistrate Wood took his seat and the preliminary trial proceeded.

Harry Diamond, husband of the deceased, was examined. On the evening of the 20th of February, his wife prepared a dose of salts for him, but he decided to take another medicine and the salts remained in the pantry ever night. In the morning his wife, not feeling very well, sald she would take the salts and did so. In a few take the saits, and did so. In a tew minutes she domplained of cramps and called for his assistance, went into convulsions, setting worse and worse even after a doctor arrived, and died in great agony in less than six hours. Delyea's house, fo which she had gone was about a block away; and she left word there to have the doctor come when he same back. His mother was upstairs when the doctor was there, but no remark of sympathy or comfort was passed by the mother after the tragedy, and he did not ask her any questions.
