THE CITIZEN'S SKATING RINK.

This fine building which was erected in 1875 by a Joint Stock Company, is situated on Fitzroy Street. It is 120 feet long and 50 feet wide. In winter it is largely patronized, and in summer is used as a Gymnasium. During the skating season strangers can obtain passes which will entitle them to skate for 14 days, on application to the Secretary or any of the Directors. The cost of the building was \$4,000.

THE NEWS ROOM

is located at the corner of Queen and Water Streets. It is well supplied with the leading American, Colonial and English newspapers and periodicals. Mr. McNeill, the proprietor, is always ready to receive strangers and show them all the attention and courtesy in his power.

SHERWOOD CEMETERY

is situated 3 miles and a half from the city, on the line of Railway. The Cemetery Company was incorporated in 1872, and the place was opened for the purpose of interment during the spring of 1873.

FIRE BRIGADE.

The fire brigade is very efficient. It consists of 2 powerful steamers and 4 hand engines, to each of which are attached 35 firemen. A Hook and Ladder Company, of 35 men, was formed in the spring of 1876, and render valuable assistance at fires. Large tanks which are kept filled with water, have been distributed throughout the most populous parts of the city.

GAS.

Charlottetown is well supplied with Gas by a company formed in 1851. The use of this illuminating apparatus is universal throughout the City. The works are situated at the eastern part of the city, on the corner of Sydney and Cumberland Streets.

PLACES OF WORSHIP.

ST. DUNSTAN'S CATHEDRAL (ROMAN CATHOLIC)

is situated on Great George Street. It is 150 feet in length and 75 in extreme width. The Bishop's Palace is a fine edifice of Nova Scotia freestone, and is located close to the Cathedral. Right Rev.
