There recently passed to his rest the Rev. J. E. Kempe, M.A., aged 97. He was the oldest clergyman in England and the senior Prebendary of St. Paul's Cathedral, having been appointed to a prebendall stall by Bishop Tait in 1861. He had been in Holy Orders for 74 years, having been ordained in the reign of William IV. His maternal great-grand-mother lived to the age of 100. while his brother, the Rev. A. A. Kempe, is still living at the age of 94 and three sisier, are over 90 years of age. One of his earliest memoirs was that of witnessing the coronation procession of George IV. in 1821. More than seventy-five years ago he went to Cambridge, graduating in 1833. Amongst his fellow-students there were Tennyson, Thackeray, and Darvin. He was a Fellow of College. In 1833 he was ordained, and twenty years later was appointed Rector of St. James', Picradilly, which cure he held till 1895. when he resigned. He was Chaplain-in-Ordinary to the Queen from 1864 to 1901, and from the latter date was an Honorary Chaplain to the King.


