TOBACCO AS A DISINFECTANT.

The old adage, that "there is a silver lining to every cloud," has found confir-mation in many directions during the scare over cholera. Public attention has been directed to sanitary conditions and the diet requisite to keep the system in a condition to repel the germs of disease. It is certain that the people know more about precautions in diet and the use of disinfectants than ever before. This is due to private as well as public endeavor. J. Edward Cowles, of the cigar department of the Thurber, Whyland Co., is on deck rith the following timely hint:

"It may be news to some, but it is never seless true, that tobacco is one of the best sinfectants known. It is said that in amburg, where cholera rages the worst, le smokes now who never smoked fore, and he who always smoked, now nokes the more.' It is rare that a man seen on the street without a cigar or a pe in his mouth, complacently meanderg along the streets and thoroughfares onfident that cholera will not bother him long as he has a cigar in his mouth.

"The tobacco plant is certainly one of the est wonderful of nature's productions. is not only susceptible to all influences the weather and climatic changes, but sorbs every pronounced taste or flavor rith which it comes in contact, (in most ses to the injury of the tobacco itself.) Neither cigars nor tobaccoshould be kept in dessicating atmosphere; such as a furace-heated room, nor in a cellar which is likely to have more or less dampness. Nor should they come in contact with such articles as tea, coffee, sugar, fish, soap, cheese, etc. But, as a disinfectant, obacco is known to kill germs of disease, as well as to destroy moths, microbes, etc." This is a good argument for the retail aler to use in selling cigars.

EXTRACTION OF PERFUMES.

Six methods of extracting perfumes are nown. The first is expression by means a special press, which is applicable with. ut too great loss of fruit skins rich in sential oils, such as orange and citron el, previously grated. Another method that of distillation, which consists of eating flowers with water in a boiler. The essential oil is volatilized and is condensed with the vapor of water in a worm and Florentine receiver. The water usually goes to the bottom and the oil floats. The oils of neroli, rose, patchouli, geranium, lavender, caraway, etc., are obtained in this way. The process is not pplicable to the delicate perfumes of the nignonette and the violet, and for them ecourse is had to maceration of the lowers in animal fat or mineral oils, which ave the property of absorbing odorless ubstances, and are then washed in lcohol. The flowers are usually heated n the fat or the oil for a variable number of hours. For perfumes which cannot endure a high temperature, the petals are placed between frames of glass coated with fat. This is the process of enfleurage. The pneumatic process, wich consists in causing a current of perfumed air or carbonic acid to be absorbed by coatings of lard on glass plates, appears not to have given satisfactory results.
