

**SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS**

ANY PERSON who is the head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Application Land Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made only on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within five miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 50 acres, solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

It is certain that a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Duties—Six months residence upon the homestead or pre-emption six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to extra homestead interest), and cultivate 50 acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right, and cannot obtain a pre-emption in certain districts, prior to 1910, may enter a pre-emption six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$500.00.

**THIRTY-FIVE NEGROES BURIED IN PRISON TRAP DOWN SOUTH**

**Efforts of Authorities to Extricate Them Failed--Prisoners Were Employed in Cotton Fields During the Day and Were Caged up at Night--Some Desperate Characters Among Them.**

JACKSON, Miss., July 22.—Trapped by flames in the second floor of an antiquated convict cage, 35 negro prisoners were burned to death at the Oakley convict farm, 20 miles from here, late last night.

While the flames rapidly ate away the only stairway leading to the second floor, the prisoners frantically tore at the heavy bars that covered the jail windows, but to no avail. Their screams brought guards and other prison attendants, but the flames drove back members of the rescue party each time they attempted to liberate the negroes, who one by one fell back into the flames and perished.

**FIRES FREQUENT AT TARRYTOWN**

Rockefeller Estate is Object of Incendiaries—Third Fire in 22 Days

[Canadian Press Despatch] TARRYTOWN, N.Y., July 22.—Flames were discovered under the main stairway in a cottage on the Rockefeller estate at Pocantico Hills yesterday, the third fire on the property within twenty-two days. The authorities of the town believe incendiaries have been at work. Mr. Rockefeller had a great deal of trouble with foreign laborers during a strike on his estate last fall, and it is suspected that some of the disgruntled employees, scores of whom have been discharged, have sought revenge by committing arson.

**ARE CONSIDERING THE PRISON FARM PROJECT**

Brantford Representatives at Woodstock To-Day on Important Mission TO ABOLISH JAILS

[Canadian Press Despatch] WOODSTOCK, July 22.—Representatives from the Counties of Oxford, Norfolk, Brant, Waterloo, Perth and Middlesex, are meeting here to-day to discuss the practicability of establishing an industrial farm to take the place of jails in these counties. One idea is to take up about one thousand acres of waste land, establish the institution and on the farm place all the prisoners who would otherwise be sent to jail for short terms for minor offences. In this way it is hoped they could be made to pay for their own board and help support their families by their work, besides increasing the value of the land.

**Workmen Buried In Pittsburg**

PITTSBURG, July 22.—Nine workmen, who were crushed by the collapse of a department store building last night will survive their injuries. The building is located at the very busiest downtown section, and is being dismantled preparatory to erecting a new structure. After the crash last night, the streets were covered up while firemen and police surgeons dug out the men who had been buried by the debris that had been carried down from the fifth floor. Street cars through the busy thoroughfares were re-routed on account of the unsafe condition of the walls that were standing.

**Could Not Enforce a Cigarette Tobacco By-Law, Says Solicitor**

**License Committee Ordered One Drawn Up But City Solicitor Said it Would be Useless to Try and Enforce Such a Statute--Suggests That the Matter be Laid Over.**

Recently a deputation of two tobaccoists waited upon the civic license committee, requesting the imposition of a high license fee on cigarette tobacco as sold in grocery stores and shops generally. It was pointed out that boys by the hundreds were learning to smoke, and were smoking tobacco before they were old enough. The reason advanced by the tobaccoists was a highly moral one, and was, of course, for the entire benefit of the boys. Accordingly the license committee, which was individually and collectively in a highly reformatory mood, set out to have a by-law whereby cigarette tobacco would be heavily licensed. City Solicitor Henderson followed instructions, remarking that the by-law wouldn't be worth the paper it was written on. In fact a boy can make a cigarette out of plug tobacco if he is so inclined, and the city solicitor knew it. Where would the distinction come in between cigarette and any other kind of tobacco? In tabling the by-law, Ald. Spence said that in view of the city solicitor's opinion, it wouldn't be worth while to proceed with the by-law.

**OPEN VERDICT WAS RETURNED**

The investigation absolutely failed to throw any further light on the mysterious happening, directly or indirectly, leaving no other course to the jury than to return the open verdict without imputing or relieving any person of responsibility in the matter.
