


A settler after obtaining homestead patent, if he cannot secure a pre-emption, may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Must reside six months in each of three years. cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$300.00. Solution of entries may count time of employment as farm labourers in Canada during 1917, as residence duties under certain conditions.


