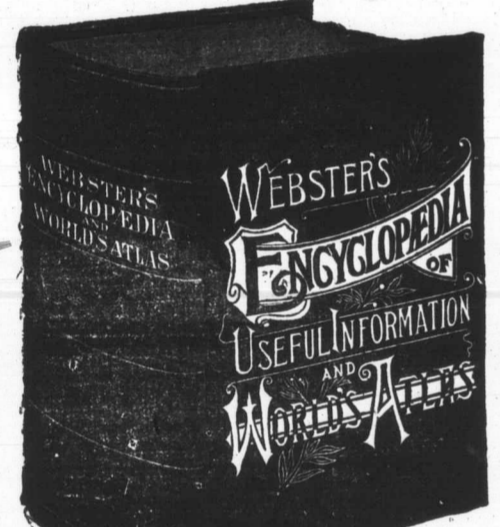

**The Horse Race.**

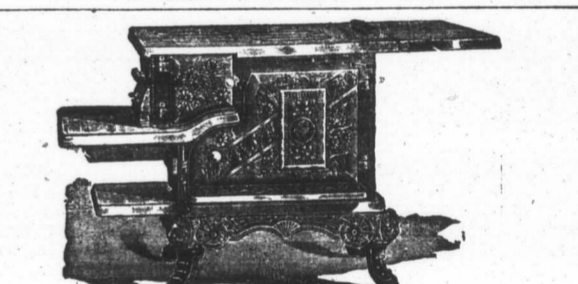
