So Declared by the Jury, and He Will Remain in Jail on December 14.

The trial of Charles S. Luckey for the murder of his sister opened at Brookville on Tuesday last and lasted until Friday evening. The evidence in the main was a repetition of that given at the former trial. The chief new evidence was given by J. A. Whiting, the old man who is reported to have said he saw Miss Luckey killed but went to the States without telling of it.
