The Berlin Philharmonic Society has 118 members. Wroning and A. J. Anson business man complete at baseball. They are doing fast plowing in some parts of the country. Montreal will have a 30-mile bicycle race on Labor Day. At Meaford the other day a good horse was sold for 75 cents. The new Belleville's new electric railway is three cents.
