NOW DOING CAY PAREE.

Oom Paul's Wild Welcome.

HE IS RECEIVED BY PRESIDENT LOUBET—ANTI-BRITISH CRIES RIGIDLY SUPPRESSED.

Paris, Nov. 26.—The City of Paris welcomed Mr. Kruger on Saturday in a whole-hearted manner, according to him a sincere reception at the railroad station, and showing by the cheering of the crowds along the route that he was cordially welcome, and had the sympathy of the populace.

Paris, while giving full vent to her pent-up feelings of sympathy with and admiration for the Boers in its reception of Mr. Kruger, comforted herself with wisdom and prudence. While a few isolated instances of anti-British shouting were unavoidable, never once throughout the day was there any semblance of an organized demonstration against the British. The Boers were enthusiastically welcomed, but essentially reassuring character of the reception; and it was with a feeling of relief that the authorities went to bed after the gloomy forebodings inspired by the unfortunate incidents which had marked previous welcomes given to Mr. Kruger en route to the French capital. Mr. Kruger's secretary announces that his chief will remain in France only a short time, going thence to Holland, where he will make an equally brief stay, after which he will return to the Mediterranean for the benefit of his health.

VISIT TO THE ELYSEE. Just before 4 o'clock a gala landau from the Elysee Palace was driven to the Hotel Scribe, and Mr. Kruger, his interpreter, and M. Crozier proceeded to the Elysee, escorted by a strong detachment of cuirassiers. The scenes of enthusiasm of the morning were repeated. Mr. Kruger was received at the Elysee with semi-official ceremonies, such as were accorded to the sovereigns who visited the exhibition. A battalion of infantry, with its standard and band, drew up in the courtyard, rendered the honors. President Loubet received Mr. Kruger in the hall of the ambassadors, where M. Delcasse, the minister of foreign affairs, was also awaiting him. The interview lasted five minutes. The Kruger then returned to his hotel, with the same ceremonial. The Boers were across the breast of his frock coat a green scarf with a red border, the insignia of his late office as president of the South African republic. He wore the cross of the Legion of Honor.

M. Loubet returned Mr. Kruger's visit at 4.30 p.m. The French president was warmly acclaimed during his drive to the Hotel Scribe, and during his stay at the hotel the crowds raised the shouts of "Vive Kruger" and "Vive Loubet." After President Loubet's departure, Mr. Kruger withdrew to his own room and declined to see further visitors, even the officials of the municipal council, who were desirous of ascertaining the day on which he would accept a reception at the Hotel de Ville, being refused, and leaving in a very discontented frame of mind. Mr. Kruger dined with very much fatigued and retired early.

MERELY A PROTEST. The Temps, semi-official, this evening, laying stress on the dignified demonstration to-day and the absence of any demonstration, says: "Mr. Kruger's mission may prove to be practically unfruitful, but his protest will be heard by the civilized world, and his last duty, as chief of his nation, will be fulfilled. The spectacle he will present will not be useless."

NO INTERVENTION. New York, Nov. 26.—The British press is entirely satisfied with the expressions of the Paris journals respecting the reception to Kruger, according to the Tribune's London correspondent. The enthusiasm of the crowds at Marseilles and elsewhere counts for little in comparison with the clear and emphatic declaration of the Paris press that nothing can be done for the Boers, and that Kruger's sincerest and most useful friends are those who tell him the simple truth. Kruger has been grateful for sympathy, but has also demanded overt acts on the part of the French Government. There is no chance that any European Government will intervene. South Africa, and never has been since the failure of the American offer.

KEPT THE SABBATH. Paris, November 26.—Mr. Kruger passed Sunday with his family at the Hotel Scribe, observing the Sabbath in accordance with the customs of his fatherland. His apartments were closed to visitors, and he remained with them indulging in perfect rest. Although the boulevardiers were alive to a late hour with merry-makers singing songs, the Hotel Scribe was not disturbed by the revelers. The morning found him quite recovered from the fatigue. After an early breakfast he conferred with Dr. Leyds. There being no church of his own in Paris, he held a private service in his apartments, surrounded by his entourage. Mr. Kruger read a portion of scripture and a member of his suite read a sermon prepared in advance. The Boer statesman ex-

pressed a desire to have an organ to assist the singing, but this could not be obtained. Two or three times during the day demonstrative crowds forced Kruger to appear on the balcony. The police arrested a few persons for uttering anti-British cries.

AN ALLEGED PLOT. New York, Nov. 26.—The Journal and Advertiser publishes a Paris despatch which says—Information has been given to the authorities of an alleged plot to assassinate Mr. Kruger at the celebration to be given in his honor here. Friends of the Boer chief have been notified, and will exercise more than ordinary vigilance.

Lewis, of this city, took place at the residence of his father on Saturday evening last, from consumption, contracted in one of the city hospitals. The deceased had many warm friends in this city who will learn with much regret of his death. While all hope had been abandoned for his recovery, the end came suddenly.

THE GIRL FROM CALCUTTA.

The Girl from Calcutta, occupied the boards at the Grand Opera House on Saturday evening. The piece is entertaining and instructive, and the characters all require clever work on the part of the actors. The only apparent weakness, if a weakness it be, was a prosaic ending to each act. Sophie Duchesne as Margaret Walker, the Girl from Calcutta, was one of the cleverest actresses that has ever appeared in the city.
