Something of Organization In Asiatic Territory-Soldier Is Well Fed, But Knows Little of Modern Tactics.

Jerusalem is Turkey's principal garrison town in Palestine. But here there are only, in normal times, 1,500 men. There are also important garrisons at both Damascus and Beirut, and minor ones at Gaza, Beersheba, Jaffa, Hebron, Haifa, Tiberias, Tyre, Sidon, Hasbeyeh, in the Lebanon, and Baal-bek. The Turkish officers stationed at bek. The Turkish officers stationed at Jerusalem are said to be capital fellows. Their kindness and courtesy to all foreigners and visitors although it has not seldom been repaid by abuse, are invariable. To keep things as lively as possible in the otherwise somewhat dismalcity, they have a band playing every afternoon in the square before the Tower of David and twice a week in the public gardens outside the city walls. The Turkish officer always looks smart and neat, but the private neither smart and neat, but the private neither cares nor is obliged to take the smallest interest in his appearance. He may be seen wearing odd shoes or none, in a dusty uniform, ragged and buttonless. His uniforms, which are made in Constantinople and Damascus, are evidentially consider to which he has to accommodification. ly all of one size, to which he has to ac-commodate himself as best he can.

The soldier is well fed, receiving two rations a day—two pounds six ounces of bread and rice soup in the morning, and at night meat, rice, and vegetables; twice a week, also, he gets a pudding made of "smeed" (fine flour) cooked with sugar and butter. The process of rationing is peculiar. The food for the day is all purchased by the orderly officer, who proceeds to market, accompanied by the doctor to examine the meat and soldiers to carry the purchase back to barracks. He also superintends the cooking of dinners. Each soldier is entitled to one pound seven ounces of good mutton daily, and before the food is portloned out the Commandant has to inspect and taste it

The officers drill their men daily until noon, and once a week march them out into the open country. They have occasional rifle practice on the Plain of Rephaim, between Jerusalem and Bethlehem, and there are spring and autumn manoeuvres. But the Turkish soldier is taken for so many other duties—night watchman; tax collector, policeman, domestic maid-of-all-work -that it is hardly surprising if he

knows little of his own. knows little of his own.

The private soldier's pay is one mejeedah (87 cents) a month. Payment is irregular, and although on great feasts he is supposed to be paid off to the last para, it is too often deferred or lapses altogether. Good service, whether officer or private, is rewarded by promotion, and all ranks enjoy the privilege of traveling at half rates by land or sea. Offenses by privates by land or sea.
