Local and Provincial.

A small vessel was loaded with corn at the "Beaver Mill" this week for shipment.

Rev. Dr. Keirstead preached in the Baptist church at Canning on Sunday evening last.

The schooner Leonard B. cleared from the York last Saturday for this port with a cargo of corn.

The teachers of Acadia Seminary will be at home Friday evening, Sept. 22, from 7:30 to 9 o'clock.

The schooner Mary McDougall, from Digby, C. B., has been here this week unloading a cargo of coal. She will probably sail to-day.

Attention is directed to the announcement of the town clerk in another column with regard to the payment of taxes and water rates.

These train loads of troops from the 1st P. L. F. and 6th Rifles passed through from Halifax to Alderhot on Wednesday night to take part in the parade there to-day.

The death of Rev. Charles H. Carey, D. D., at Sandbrook, N. H., president of the Theological Institute, removes one of the Acadia graduates of the class of '58, of which Dr. E. M. Saunders and Judge Westhabe were members.

The Bishop of Nova Scotia will hold confirmation services in the new Anglican church in Canning on Sunday, the first day of October next, at 10 o'clock in the morning. In the evening his Lordship will preach in the Church of St. John, Church Street.
