COMMUNICATION

Editor Herald:
Dear Sir—Will you permit me space to reply to a letter in last evening's Free Press over the signature of Ald. Ferguson in reference to the purchase and sale of water pipe.

Of course the worthy alderman is Sir Oracle, whose weighty utterances always carry conviction. They are always so true, so pure and well chosen that we must be guided by his opinion. In this deliverance nobody would presume to doubt the pure altruism of his motives or would dream that his aim was to squelch Ald Shaw and Ald Young or to boost Ald McKenzie.

Let me now state the facts and show just where this truthful Bill, this keen, all-knowing business man comes in. When the pipe was bought Ald Ferguson must have thought it was good business because he approved all the negotiations leading up to the purchase, and voted in its favor when the motion to buy the pipe was placed before the Council on April 15th, 1913. In fact every member of the Council including Ald Ferguson fully approved of the purchase and the price was \$42 per ton.

The reason for the purchase was the fact that the paving contracts had been let with Ald Ferguson's approval, and everybody expected they would be gone on with at once. But the water pipes had to be laid before this could be done, and besides that it was decided again with Ald Ferguson's approval, and support, that certain extensions of the water system would be made. At that time there was no doubt the Loan Bylaw would be approved. But it was defeated by a small majority and the work was held up. Then the strike occurred and tied up everything. If only the keen-witted business man had posted us as to his views and as to coming events we might all have been as wise as he is, but alas, it is so easy to be wise after the event.

Now as to the sale. I admit it was a mistake to say the least, but I deny that either Ald Shaw or myself are responsible other than we happen to be chairmen of committees to whom the proposed transaction was mentioned. The fact is we were misled by the responsible official and did not take steps to prevent a transaction of which we were not fully informed. However, the loss, if any, is a trifling one, and in any case the city will receive nearly \$1,000 cash for goods that can easily be spared. The worst feature is that the thing is done without the full knowledge and approval of the Council.

But during this last year or two several things have been done which places our friend Ald Ferguson and the Street Committee in a far worse position so far as serious loss and responsibility to the city is concerned. There is the Haliburton street and Front street paving mess, the Bridge mess and several others for which these aldermen are responsible in the sense that each committee is responsible for all work carried out in that particular department. As a matter of fact they were misinformed and misled the Council and the misinformed has added very largely to the burdens of the ratepayers. Even now the work on Union Street and on Grace street, good and useful as it is, is being carried out without any authority from the Council and the Street Committee is responsible.

Now I would be the last man to blame anyone for doing admittedly good work even if done without full legal warrant and I am always prepared to accept full responsibility for all my actions and censure and punishment when deserved, but I am not disposed to submit to unwarranted stricture, least of all from one who is infinitely more guilty than I am and whose tactics savor of a sneak too cowardly to play the game in the open, but makes his attacks when he deems himself safe, and beyond the reach of retaliation.

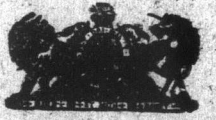
THE CORPORATION OF THE CITY OF NANAIMO MUNICIPAL NOTICE

SYNOPSIS OF COAL MINING REGULATIONS

Coal mining rights of the Dominion in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, the Yukon Territory, the North-West Territories and in a portion of the Province of British Columbia, may be leased for a term of twenty-one years renewable for a further term of 21 years at an annual rental of \$1 an acre. Not more than 2,500 acres will be leased to one applicant.

Application for a lease must be made by the applicant in person to the Agent or Sub-Agent of the district in which the rights applied for are situated.

In surveyed territory the land must be described by sections, or legal subdivisions of sections, and in unsurveyed territory the tract applied for shall be staked out by the applicant himself.

Each application must be accompanied by a fee of \$5 which will be returned if the rights applied for are not available, but not otherwise. A royalty shall be paid on the merchantable output of the mine at the rate of five cents per ton.

The person operating the mine shall furnish the Agent with sworn returns accounting for the full quantity of merchantable coal mined and pay the royalty thereon. If the coal mining rights are not being operated, such returns should be furnished at least once a year.

The lease will include the coal mining rights only, recorded by Chap. 27 of 4-5 George V. amended to 12th June, 1914.

For full information application should be made to the Secretary of the Department of the Interior, Ottawa, or to any Agent or Sub-Agent of Dominion Lands.
