THE ULTIMATUM TO TURKEY.

After a long period of rest from internal troubles Egypt is again threatening to become a storm centre. The cause is not due to any cessation in the magnificent work of reconstruction carried on under the auspices of the British Government. It comes from the sick man of the East and the nominal suzerain of the land of the Pharaohs. So far as can be judged the action of the Sultan in raising the frontier question and occupying Tabah, a place hitherto recognized as Egyptian, has been inspired by ulterior motives. He has never wholly accepted the practical emancipation of Egypt and in his present impetuous position, the vision of a prosperous country capable of adding to his straightened revenues, presents possibilities of a peculiarly attractive character.

The British Government is exhibiting considerable activity and firmness in the present instance. The Egyptian garrison is being strengthened, the fleet at Malta has been given secret orders for action, and the Porte has been notified to immediately vacate Tabah or something will happen that will not be to its liking. Thus the whirligig of time has again brought its revenge. Time was when the evacuation of Egypt appeared prominently in the programme of the Liberal party. Mr. Gladstone himself, to whose timid and hesitating policy much of the complications from which the country suffered must be attributed, more than once fixed the date of withdrawal. Circumstances, however, proved too constraining and the occupation continued to the lasting benefit of the burdened and suffering fellahs of that country. The best authorities in the Empire and the British press generally demand that resolute action be taken and declare that not only the incalculable British interests in Egypt are endangered but the safety of the suzerainty itself and generally Britain's great work of civilization in Egypt stands in peril. It would certainly be regrettable in the highest degree if Egyptian prosperity is to be stayed, and the situation will tax the capacity of the Campbell-Bannerman administration in an unexpected manner, but with Lord Grey in the Foreign office there is little danger that any weakness will develop.

It is a curious fact that whenever German and British interests conflict elsewhere the dispute is followed by the rise of difficulties in some other of the many points where Britain's influence extends. Germany acceded readily enough to the increased freedom in Egypt accorded by the Franco-British agreement, but they did not desert Britain from standing loyally by France during the Morocco imbroglio. Of recent years the influence of the Kaiser at Constantinople has predominated and he has gone out of his way on several occasions to express his sympathy with the unsavory ruler who bulks so largely in the Mohammedan world. It is scarcely conceivable that so important a step would be taken by the Sultan as the occupation of Tabah without encouragement followed, as it has been, by the massing of what is described as a considerable force in the neighborhood of Damascus.

When John Mitchell decided that there should be no great coal strike this year he was well advised and much misery and suffering has been averted not only in the immediate

ranks of the miners themselves but in the homes of the poor of the whole American continent. It is to be hoped that the miners will return to work at once and the coal supply resume its normal sway.

The monopoly which the Standard Oil Company has long held in the United States is seriously threatened by the President, who waved the "big stick" in Congress yesterday and emphatically declared that the extortions must cease.

ENGINE RAN INTO STREET CAR

Fatal Accident Occurs at Montreal This Morning.

One Man Killed and Several Injured.

Engine Was Engaged in Shunting at Time of Accident.

MONTREAL, May 5.—A Grand Trunk shunting engine struck a Centre street car of the Montreal Street Railway at St. Patrick's St. crossing of Wellington St., near South end of Canal Bridge, shortly before seven o'clock this morning and one workman, whose name has not yet been learned, was instantly killed, and a number of others shaken up. The engine struck the car with considerable force, swinging the car around and carried it up the track in a westerly direction for about 100 yards. The dead man was taken to the morgue, but has not yet been identified. Another man injured was taken to the General Public Hospital.

BANK PROMOTION.

Frank L. Patten to Become General Manager of Dominion Bank.

WINNIPEG, Man., May 5.—There is a well defined rumor in city banking circles that Frank L. Patten, manager of the Dominion Bank of Winnipeg, will succeed the late T. G. Brough as general manager of the Bank. Mr. Patten although one of the youngest banking men of prominence in Canada, is a veteran manager in the Canadian west, having been manager of the old Federal Bank in Winnipeg in the early eighties. He is a son of the late Archdeacon Patten of Cornwall, Ont.
