we, in many cases, find that the mother is herself lacking in self control, cannot endure having the child cry, and thinks that affection is best expressed in unbridled indulgence; there has been failure to teach the baby, from its birth, obedience to law and order and the child soon learns that all he has to do to attract attention is by kicking, screaming, holding his breath and so on, and that then he will get what he wants.

Many physical causes of tantrums centre about the child's genitalia; and the child should be taken to the family doctor for careful examination and removal of such causes, under an anesthetic, if necessary. Thus will a vast amount of perversity in later life be avoided. Another thing that must be established very early in childhood is regular habit as to stool and the like.

Other physical defects that might make a child irritable, neurotic and perhaps ungovernable, are strabismus, adenoids, enlarged tonsils, imperfect teeth, poor nutrition (too much feeding, especially with sweets, as well as too little) and unhygienic living. It will not do just to say the child has nerves and ask the doctor to prescribe the drugist to hand over the counter some "dope" for it. The reason for tantrums must be found in "cause," and then intelligent remedial action must be taken.

PRESIDENT HARDING TO THE CONFERENCE

Congratulates the Nations on Achievements of the Washington Conference

[Associated Press by Licensed Wire.]
 Washington, Feb. 6.—President Harding, in addressing the conference said that three months ago it had been his privilege to welcome the delegates and express a hope for the success of their deliberations.

"Today it is my great privilege, and even greater pleasure, to come to make acknowledgement," he continued. "It is one of the supreme compensations of life to contemplate worth while accomplishments and to be able to address the conference, to speak congratulations and to offer the thanks of our nation, our people, and myself, to the men who have so bravely and so ably volunteered to attend them for the world. My own gratification is beyond my capacity to express. This conference has wrought a truly great achievement."

President Harding continued in part:
 "It little matters what we appraise as the outstanding accomplishment. Any one of these alone would have justified the conference. But the whole achievement has so cleared the atmosphere that it will seem like breathing the refreshing air of a new morning of promise."
 "You have written the first deliberate and effective expression of great powers in the consciousness of peace, of war's utter futility, and challenged the sanity of competitive preparation for each other's destruction. You have halted folly and filled burdens and revealed to the world that the one sure way to recover from the sorrow and ruin and staggering obligations of a world war is to end the strife in preparation for more of it, and turn human energies to the constructive of peace."

"Not all the world is yet tranquilized. But here is the example to imitate with new hope and in apprehension. At this table came understanding, and understanding brands armed conflict as abominable in the eyes of enlightened civilization."

"I once believed in armed preparedness. I advocated it. But I have now come to believe there is better preparedness in a public mind and a world opinion made ready to grant justice precisely as it exacts it. And justice is better served in conference of peace than in conflicts of arms."

"No intrigue, no offensive or defensive alliances, no involvements have wrought your agreements, but reasoning with each other to common understanding has made new relationships among governments and peoples, new securities for peace and new opportunities for achievement and at last, happiness."

"Here have been established the contacts of reason, here has come the inevitable understandings of face to face exchanges when passion does not inflame. The very atmosphere of national selfishness, into retirement. Viewpoints were exchanged, differences composed and men came to understand how common, after all, are human aspirations, how alike, indeed, and how easily reconcilable are our national aspirations, how sane and simple and satisfying to seek the relationships of peace and security."

"It may be that the naval holiday here contemplated will expire with the treaties, but I do not believe it. Those of us who live another decade are more likely to witness a growth of public opinion, strengthened by the new experience, which will make nations more concerned with the living in fulfillment of God's high intent than with agencies of warfare and destruction. Since this conference of nations has pointed with unanimity to the way of peace today, the conferences in the future, under appropriate conditions and with aims both well conceived and definite, may illumine the highways and byways of human activity. The torches of understanding have been lighted and they ought to glow and encircle the globe."

"Again, gentlemen of the conference, congratulations and the gratitude of the United States. To Belgium, to the British Empire, to China, to France, to Italy, to Japan, to the Netherlands, and to Portugal—I can wish no more than the same feeling which we experience, of honorable and honored contribution to happy human advancement, and a new sense of security in the righteous pursuits of peace and all attending good fortune."
