# Farm and Household.

# Geraniums for Winter.

A correspondent of the *American  
Rural Home*, writing on this subject,  
says: "Almost all plants, to have  
them do well in winter, must have  
special treatment during the summer  
months. Not all the varieties are  
good winter-bloomers, but some  
kinds are to be specially recom-  
mended for that purpose. Plants lifted  
from the garden which have grown to  
a considerable size will disappoint you  
by taking a long time to recover  
from the effects of lifting, if they do  
at all. It is better to take young  
plants in summer. Then we have  
blossoms in November and all dur-  
ing the winter, until time to turn  
them out into the garden in spring  
for summer blooming. You want  
young, healthy plants to begin with,  
which set in pots of a small size, say  
two or three inches, shift occasionally  
but always use the next size,  
making larger and larger, until the  
young may make a little trouble for  
drying out where there is no green-  
house for the small pots, but a shallow  
box to set them into with moss or  
sand packed around them and kept  
damp will prevent all this trouble.  
The effect of the foregoing treatment  
is to obtain stocky plants and to pre-  
vent premature blooming. Good  
winter-blooming geraniums can only  
be obtained in this way. Make the  
last shift in August for the largest-  
sized plants, the others in the months  
following. Scarlet require larger  
pots than the other colors. Pinks,  
salmon, and whites thrive in some  
what contracted space. Pinch out  
all lower buds, until the plants are  
taken in for winter. Of all the  
geraniums, be sure and have some  
of the scented-leaved ones. They  
are every body's pets, thrifty growers,  
and never bothered with insects of  
any description. The common rose,  
large rose, skeleton-leaved, and little  
pet are my choice. I have often  
been asked why geraniums do not  
bloom in winter. In nine cases out  
of ten, I find the trouble is a want of  
stimulants. A geranium will grow  
on earth and water alone, but will  
not bloom well. Soap-suds is splen-  
did for all house-plants. Soak the  
pots once a week in soap-suds; the  
dirtier the suds are the better.  
Drain and rinse off with clean water  
and note the results."

# Manuring Trees.

We notice frequently outlandish  
recommendations, agriculturally and  
horticulturally, which must result in  
failure and disappointment. We have  
now before us one of these for  
stimulating the growth of trees, by  
boring holes in the ground and pouring  
in liquid manure about the roots! How  
the roots are generally to be got  
at in this way we cannot see.  
What benefit can be derived there-  
from by applying the same liquid over  
ground and let it soak in? If the  
surface is very hard it should be  
loosened. Or, what we contend is  
still better, topdress the surface as  
far as the branches extend with good  
manure, and the substance will soon  
find its way uniformly to the roots  
with the assistance of the rains.  
Our own judgment and practice has  
always been to treat the soil in which  
the tree, fruit, and ornamental grow,  
as far as can be done, the same as  
soil that is cultivated for vegetables  
or garden crops, and we have always  
been satisfied with the result.

As some evidence of the effect of  
such application we will mention this  
instance: Some years ago a hem-  
lock spruce had a rusty color. It  
was about twelve feet in height, and  
must have been set out in a spot  
where the soil was not so affluent as  
that where others were planted. At  
any rate two wheelbarrow loads of  
good manure spread out as far as the  
extremity of the branches, restored it  
perfectly the ensuing year, and it  
was one of our handsomest trees.

# Killing Frogs.

The custom still in vogue in some  
parts of the country, of bringing the  
necks of fowls, to us, seems a relic  
of barbarism. It is not only cruel,  
but is unsanitary. When killed in  
this way, instead of cutting the head  
off, the blood all remains in the body,  
rendering the flesh unwholesome, as  
it would be in the case of the ox.  
The blood is very putrefactive, as all  
may know by allowing some to re-  
main in the sun a half hour in warm  
weather, omitting a bad odor in a  
very short time. When we remem-  
ber that about one half of the blood  
is composed of the waste and worn  
out portions of the body, semi-pu-  
trous, and that this putrefaction, with  
the pure portion, soon putrefies  
while remaining just where they are

# Manure.

The quality of stable manure de-  
pends upon the quantity and quality of  
the feeding stuffs used, and on the  
amount of milk or other products ob-  
tained from the animals. As a rule, but  
a small proportion of the food are per-  
manently retained in the body or ex-  
creted as milk, etc., while the remain-  
ing passes into manure. As a conse-  
quence, the richer the feed the richer  
the manure. Good feeding pays not only  
through increased production by the animal,  
but through the improved quality of the manure  
as well. If confined in stables or  
close lots, with abundant feed, it is  
estimated that medium sized ani-  
mals will produce in a year the follow-  
ing amounts of manure. Horse,  
exclusive of loss during work, nine  
tons; ox or cow, ten to twelve tons;  
sheep, (October to May) three quar-  
ters of a ton, and a hog, one and a  
quarter to two tons.
