Guthrie, Okla., March 30.—Crazy Snake or Chitto Harjo, the chief of the Creek Indians, offered to-day to surrender. The proffer of the wily old chief, who has been sought by five companies of state militia since was made to officers of the

Sunday, was made to officers of the militia this morning. He sent word that he desired to come in but feared surrendering to the local authorities.

With Crazy Snake and a large portion of his band of Indians, half breeds and negroes apparently trapped in the north Canadian bottoms, more than 300 Oklahama militiamen, deputies, cowboys and farmers hurried forward at dawn to-day to join those already on guard to crush or capture the beligerents.

The Indians were in a timbered stronghold. On all sides ranged a dense growth of underbrush, flanked by great trees, capable of affording protection against a legion of gatling guns. In this fortress, but by nature the like of which has afforded protection to red men and paleface alike in many a fierce affray, Crazy Snake and a portion of his band crept last night when Col. Hoffman's pursuing soldiery got too near for comfort. Here they prepared to make their last stand.
