Mix again lightly, and serve in ten minutes.

The German educational authorities, too, are at present giving considerable attention to left hand work, especially in thei: technical and mechanical schools. The students are taught to saw, plane and hammer as well with the left hand as with the right, and the economical and industrial importance of ambidexter-ity is firmly impressed upon the minds of young men and women.
