MUCH IS EXPECTED  
OF GERMAN LEADER

New Secretary of Foreign Affairs Takes Office With Confidence of the People—Great Things Are Expected From Him.

Berlin, Aug. 23.—Never have the German people expected greater things from any minister of state than they do from their new secretary of foreign affairs, Herr von Kiderlen-Waechter.

A pupil and disciple of Bismarck, the minister is expected to lose no time in steering the ship of German diplomacy back into the old-time Bismarckian channels. The international situation is pictured by German political publicists as offering peculiarly attractive opportunities for his talents. Events both in the far and near east, he is assured, require Germany to be on the watch with more than ordinary vigilance, and as the moves she makes in the immediate future may depend, we are informed, not only the fatherland's imperial future, but the peace of the world.

Herr von Rath, one of the popular political stars of the day, adjures Herr von Kiderlen-Waechter, "not to be blinded by the peace sun now shedding its rays so brilliantly." Not to overtake "the perils which will perhaps threaten us in the near future." Herr von Rath thinks that the English prime minister's recent rosy speech should not divert German attention from "the possibility that we shall have to wage war on several fronts within a short time." From a variety of quarters the hope is ardently expressed that Herr von Kiderlen, above all, will avoid the suspicion that he is a pacifist.

Interpreting this view, the Post resents angrily the suggestion that the Kaiser should accept the Nobel peace prize. Germany grows big and powerful through wars and there are still plenty of papers that dread the very idea of eternal and universal peace.

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Situation in Austria. In Austria, Herr von Kiderlen-Waechter first move as German secretary of foreign affairs was his visit to his Austrian colleague Count von Aehrenthal at Marienbad, even before he actually took up the duties of his office in Berlin. His visit was an exceedingly favorable impression. The Austrian press lost no time in pointing out that the meeting between two ministers was another striking illustration of the intimate relationship existing between Austria-Hungary and the German empire, and the firmness of their alliance. Proof of this had already been placed before the world during the Serbian crisis last year, and it is now looked upon as the strongest of the political forces of the day. The success attained last year by the two allied powers has been of immense benefit to both, and serves to strengthen the conviction that acting in concert, they are invincible in their own sphere.

A GREAT RECEPTION

Thousands Turn Out in Quebec to Meet the Ambassador from the Vatican—His Message from the Pope—Catholics of Canada.

Part of the building will be given over to offices, but besides the theatre there will be a roof garden. Chairs will be used in the theatre instead of stationary seats, and it is said that not only will fair patrons be supplied with cigarettes, but they will be able to buy light luncheon and liquid refreshments.

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Engineer Is Blamed for Wreck at Durand. Grand Trunk Officials' Private Investigation Lays Responsibility for Wreck Upon Brock and Charges Him With Moral Idiotcy.

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THE TARIFF PROBLEM  
IS A DIFFICULT ONE

The Cardinal Feature of the Canadian Tariff Is Not an Easy One to Settle.

Nelson, B.C., Aug. 29.—"The tariff problem is not an easy one to settle," said Sir Wilfrid Laurier in the course of his address at the mammoth meeting here last night. "We are asked on either hand by different interests for free trade and protection. It would be our aim to evolve a tariff suitable to all men and calculated to benefit the whole country. We will make progress. The tariff is not yet perfect, but one thing has been done. The cardinal feature and standing principle of our tariff is the British preference and so long as we stay dependent on the British Empire, this policy has met opposition. Our opponents say we should not grant preference unless we receive preference in return. Not so, I have only to say to you that the policy of Great Britain is the policy of free trade. They say we should ask Great Britain to change her fiscal policy. How absurd! It is not the policy of the Canadian government to ask Britain to change her fiscal position. We make fiscal arrangements to suit our own interests and we maintain our policy according to as it suits our own interests."

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GRADING COMMENCED  
ON NEW C.N.R. LINE

Contract Let For Part of Grade For Baffin Bay—Princess Albert Road Will Form Valuable Connection for Hudson's Bay Line.

North Battleford, Aug. 29.—Grading has commenced on the North Battleford, Prince Albert line from this end. J. W. Millar has the contract for grading fifteen miles, the work to be completed this fall. In view of the Hudson's Bay route being a settled fact, this new line is of more than passing significance. With this line completed, and the projected line from here through the Cutknife country to Calgary built, the Canadian Northern Railway will have a direct route from Calgary through North Battleford and Prince Albert to the Hudson's Bay.
