He leaves a wife and family and it is believed that the accident occurred while the man was trying to save some wharf timber.

Ellis was unanimously re-elected as People's Warden, and Mr. P. F. LeMesurier was chosen by the Rector as his own Warden. The annual reports read by Rev. Mr. Uphill gave the statistics of births, deaths, marriages, services, etc., of the past year. The annual report showed that there was a handsome balance in the Bank to the credit of the Parish. After all the committees reports had been read and passed, votes of thanks were accorded to the retiring Church Warden, Choir, Sunday School Supts., Teachers and others for the excellent work done by them during the year. The meeting closed with Benediction.

### Landed at Last!

After being kept nearly a week in the old shed on the South Side and suffering much discomfort, the sixty-eight sealers of the Newfoundland were landed yesterday evening, and landing at Woods' wharf were taken to the Small-pox Observation Hospital. Several of the men we hear are disgusted that they should have been left there so long, and believe as most citizens do, that they should have been comfortably domiciled long ago. Before being removed the men were given a medicated bath. They will remain in the Hospital or shed for about 14 days more.

### Got Six Months.

Const. Fred. Churchill yesterday brought in an old woman, a resident of Botwood, to serve a term of six months imprisonment in the Penitentiary. She was convicted of receiving stolen property and prompting minors to steal. The woman's two grandsons and another stole hens, etc., and told Magistrate Burt, before whom they were brought, that the woman had encouraged them to do so. They stole 50 hens, butter, eggs and other things. The Magistrate dismissed the woman, however, was given six months.

### St. Bon's Ladies Meet.

At the Quarterly Meeting of the Ladies Association of St. Bonaventure's College, held yesterday afternoon, resolutions of condolence were passed to Mrs. T. J. Edens on the death of her daughter, Miss Mary Edens, at Luxemburg, and to Mrs. P. J. Kennedy, on the death of her husband. The former resolution was proposed by Lady Morris and seconded by Mrs. Mitchell and Mrs. G. Byrne, and the latter was proposed by Mrs. L. E. Keegan and seconded by Mrs. Higgins and Mrs. Burke. The meeting then adjourned till next Wednesday at 4 p.m.

### Pleasing Presentation.

The presentation to Mr. S. Garland, to which the Telegram recently alluded, took place last evening when the tidewaiters, boatmen and lockers met at their rooms and presented Mr. Garland with a handsome meerschaum pipe and walking stick, both neatly inscribed. They were accompanied by an address, which was read by Secretary Jas. Hanley, while the President, Mr. W. K. Morrissey, made the presentation, prefacing it by a happy and fluent speech. Mr. Garland has been 20 years treasurer of the association and has given every satisfaction, besides being courteous and obliging to all.

### Stole Watch and Ring.

Mr. Hutchings, K.C., Deputy Minister of Justice, had the following message yesterday afternoon from Magistrate Power, of Bell Island:—"Mary Purcell, of Harbor Grace, 18 years of age, brought before me yesterday charged with larceny of watch and ring, pleaded guilty and will be sentenced to-morrow, Friday."

## Veto Fight at Close Quarters.

Special Evening Telegram, LONDON, To-Day.  
The debate on clause two of the Veto Bill which restricts the power of the House of Lords over measures other than money bills opened in the House of Commons yesterday. Mr. Winston Churchill refused even to consider a motion to limit the operation of clause two to three years. He declared the Government would not accept any time limit during which period they would undertake to reform the Upper House. Premier Asquith declared the Government would accept no amendment which would exclude from the operation of the clause any legislation which might be dubbed "class" legislation. "The Veto of the Crown is gone," exclaimed the Prime Minister. "It is as dead as Queen Anne. It has gone by disuse, so ought the Veto of the Lords to have gone." Opposition Leader Balfour said that the claim that the Commons should be omnipotent in Legislation was a "monstrous doctrine." It meant absolute single chamber Government. He maintained that the electors did not know when they returned the Government, that they were voting for Home Rule, and for the whole Constitution being sacrificed in a scandalous bargain between the Government and the Nationalists.
