Bay Robert's Man Takes Issue With The Trade Review.

Editor Evening Telegram,
Dear Sir,—In the last issue of the Trade Review you will find the following item:—
"There are said to be three thousand languages and dialects in the world, and these do not include the peculiar vernacular of Branch or Bay Roberts."

If the editor of the Trade Review will consult a modern work on philology he will find that language has its history, and that everything points to a time when men had no language, that they had gone on inventing words and improving their language as necessity demanded it. He will also find that all the languages of the world can be placed into three or four, probably three great families.

If the editor of the Trade Review were to visit the different communities of Newfoundland and then visit the homeland of their parent stocks, he would find interesting likenesses in dialect.
I wish to impress upon him that the "vernacular of Bay Roberts" is not a linguistic monstrosity as his item

would cause people to consider it when he singles it out from so many and tells them that it is not included among them. If he were to visit some of the fishing villages along the coast of England, and then pay a visit to Bay Roberts, it will very soon dawn upon him from whence sprang his "vernacular." He will find people there, speaking very much the same as their kinsfolk on the shores of England. He will also find that they cling with characteristic Anglo-Saxon tenacity to the customs of their forefathers, for I am proud to be able to say that the younger generation at Bay Roberts still speak "the vernacular" of their fathers, with a modification of course.

The young generation of Bay Roberts have sprung from a stock that has been buffeted by the winds and waves of the troublesome sea. Both they and their fathers have reaped the harvest of the sea to the benefit of their country and themselves, but that is not all. They have done it, facing the dangers that may beset them, for Bay Roberts has many a time been called upon to mourn the loss of her brave fisher folk.

Is it to such a people, worthy and direct descendants of the race that has done so much in making our nation what it is to-day that his penny a liner would fling his poisoned arrow or hurl his insult?
The younger race of Bay Roberts

have not been lagging in the race. Brawn and brain are now the ruling forces. They have inherited fibre and tenacity from their sea-dog fathers, and they are not found lacking in grey-matter. For confirmation of this I refer the editor of the Trade Review to the records of the different seats of learning which they have attended. They have succeeded and done creditably in theology, medicine, engineering and arts. In the teaching profession they have taken a leading part, and hampered and all as they have been by this "peculiar vernacular" which the editor of the Trade Review dubs them with, they have found no difficulty in making themselves clearly understood wherever they went. They have also frequently achieved honours even in the use of English.

ROME, Oct. 9.
For attempting to assassinate King Emmanuel on March 14th, Antonio Balba was, to-day, condemned to thirty years penal servitude.

LONDON, Oct. 9.
The first encounter between the Serbian and Turkish troops is reported at Javir in the district of Vipazar. The Serbian premier declared to-day that action by the Powers had been taken too late.

PARIS, This Morning.
Airmen belonging to the opposing armies of the Turks and Balkan States are likely to soon come into conflict in actual warfare for the first time. The Balkan States as well as Turkey have a number of expert airmen, most of whom learned to fly in France. They also possess considerable aerial equipment.

HALIFAX, Oct. 9.
The vessel reported on fire off Pictou last night was the Terrence Bay with provisions. Gasoline exploded setting fire to the vessel. The crew of five and a lady passenger, took to the boats and reached the shore safely. The schooner burned to the water's edge and sank. Several of the crew were slightly burned.

LONDON, Oct. 9.
Prince Arthur of Connaught who is now on his way back from Japan, where he attended the Mikado's funeral, has according to gossip, two pleasant tidings to confront him. One is his marriage appointment as viceroy of India, and the other that a dukedom will be conferred on him, and the old title of Duke of Kent revived in his favor.

PARIS, This Morning.
The presentation by the Powers will be made to the Ottoman Government to-day, but with feeble hope that the fire lighted by Montenegro will be extinguished. The press here generally foresees the spread of war in the Balkan States, but is cheered by the promise of the Powers not to permit any disturbance of the peace of Europe as a whole.

SOFIA, Oct. 9.
The Bulgarian cabinet, after considering the Russo-Austrian note issued a semi-official statement, which says that Bulgarian ministers have unfortunately failed to find what they expected, namely precise details of the reforms, which the Powers have proposed to Turkey, and guarantees for their execution. Before making any decision on the subject the Bulgarian cabinet will consult the Greek and Serbian governments.

PARIS, This Morning.
The visit of the Russian foreign minister to Berlin is of vast importance, for it is directed to allaying any suspicions existing between Russia and Austria. Mutual confidence between these nations existed the press says but this was not enough as one false step would create suspicion and set the whole of Europe in flames. The result of the visit of Russia is believed to be in an endeavour to bring influence to bear on Serbia not to anger Austria by the invasion of Navinzeof.

HALIFAX, Oct. 9.
The auxiliary term schooner Geo. B. Cluett, one of the Grenfell Mission ships, arrived in port last night from Labrador, via St. Anthony. This morning a fire was discovered in the forecastle. The Water Boat and other crew went to her in the stream to render assistance and after some difficulty the fire was extinguished. Dr. Little, head surgeon of the mission, with Mrs. Little and child, were on board. The Cluett leaves for Boston to-morrow, and after loading supplies will return to Labrador.

LONDON, Oct. 9.
More than ten thousand Mongols have been slain by the troops of President Yuan Shi Kai in Eastern Mongolia, according to a St. Petersburg despatch to the Times. The victorious troops are now advancing in a circle on Uрга. The object of the outrage perpetrated is to stamp out the incultation recently displayed by the people of Eastern Mongolia, to join outer Mongolia. Berett of Russian support the despatch says that the Government at Uрга is now disposed to receive an emissary from Peking.

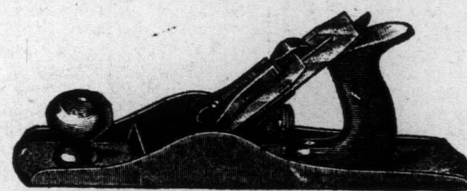

BOSTON, Oct. 9.
In the second series of the Baseball championship games to-day between the Boston Red Sox and New York Giants, resulted 6 to 6.

LONDON, Oct. 9.
Expert military opinion is divided as to the probable course of the Balkan war, but it is agreed on all sides that the struggle will be one of hideous, perhaps unexampled, ferocity. More over which ever side is successful the peace of Europe will be imperilled. Austria is resolved not to permit any territorial expansion by Serbia or Bulgaria, while in the event of the Turks sweeping their armies before them and trampling the Balkan States underfoot, the sympathy of the Russian people with the conquered Slavs will be aroused, and the Russian Government be forced by popular passion to take an active part in the game. Europe is divided into two hostile camps, England, France and Russia occupying one; and Germany, Austria and Italy the other. The six Powers, mutually mistrustful of one another, are agreed to do their utmost to localize the war, so that not any of them should have reasonable grounds for interfering, and annexing some territory which each of the others

thinks it had the better right to. Thus the Powers have decided to maintain the status quo as far as they are directly concerned, but circumstances may prove too strong for them, and if one intervenes and declares war in the interest of peace, others may follow suit in some righteous cause.

RIMOUSKI, Oct. 9.
Search to-day failed to clear up the mystery surrounding the disappearance of the yacht Bernadette, which with a party of seven has been missing since Saturday night. The steamer Evelyn, after twenty-four hours search, reports no trace of the missing yacht. The Bernadette left the North Shore in a friendly race with the yacht Oenone. The Oenone arrived in port early on Monday morning, reporting a rough passage across. The missing men are Harold Blair, Emile Tessier, son of Judge Tessier, F. X. Proulx, Secretary of the town, Aringuet, a Rimouski merchant, Beckinsale and Bonner, clerks in the Bank of Commerce, and George McKinnon, clerk in Price Brothers' office. Everything points to the Bernadette having foundered while crossing the St. Lawrence.
