The rumor that Sir Robert Bond will retire from politics is quite popular with the People's Party, and Sir Robert is spoken of most eulogistically. The Bell Island Miner would not be surprised if Sir Robert had Newfoundland a last good-bye before many months. The sapient editor declares that Sir Robert would like to enter Imperial politics and assures him that with his wealth and engaging personality this should not be difficult. The Bell Island Miner continues thus: "Many Colonials, particularly Canadians, have achieved distinction as parliamentarians in the Motherland and few of them have at the beginning, been so well equipped both as regards experience and ability as the handsome leader of the Opposition. Newfoundlanders of all shades of political opinion will regret to lose Sir Robert, but all will unite in wishing him every success in England and will watch his career there with interest."

As we pointed out when we denied a similar rumor about Sir Robert Bond selling out the Grange, which was circulated in the Daily News, on the eve of Sir Robert Bond's last visit to England, in February, the wish is father to the thought. The measure of the rejoicing of the People's Party over these rumors is a measure of the fear they feel at the prowess of Sir Robert Bond as Leader of the Liberal Party at the fall elections. The Tories throw up their hats in the hope that Sir Robert Bond will not fight them. Their rejoicings are premature and they are laying up for themselves a lot of disappointment. Sir Robert Bond is not courted the laudation of those who treated him with brutality in the campaigns of 1908 and 1909. He has too much contempt for them and disgust for their wasteful administration of public affairs.

\$125,000 Damage.

SYDNEY, N. S., To-day.
The Whittsey Pier fire was the most disastrous since the great blaze of 1910. Twenty buildings, including the Catholic Church of the Holy Redeemer, Holy Redeemer Convent, and Globe House are burned, and the loss will be around \$125,000. The fire broke out in the roof of the Holy Redeemer Church probably through defective electric wiring. Excepting for one or two, all of the families affected saved a good deal of their furniture. Most of the furnishings of the Holy Redeemer Church and the Convent were also saved. These two buildings were wood. The Church was built in 1901 at an initial cost of \$20,000. The Convent a little later, cost \$40,000. With the improvements made since, the loss of the Church property reached \$80,000. Among the most valuable church furnishings was an organ installed a few years costing \$5,000. The Holy Redeemer Convent had 400 pupils who were returning to school after noon recess. The classes will be re-opened for the balance of the term in several halls of the district. Besides the church buildings all other buildings burned were dwellings except one, which was a tailor's shop and candy store. Fifteen families are homeless.

The News and the Exodus.

In a rather laboured and more or less ambiguous manner the News this morning reiterates its assertion that numbers of our people are coming back from foreign parts where they had settled, to once more reside in the homeland. In fact one reading the News would think that a veritable immigration of long expatriated Newfoundlanders had set in. It is well known that each trip the cross Gulf boats—Bruce and Lutross—take away young men from our shores to Canada and the States and each Stephen and Fletcher also large numbers of steerage passengers to go to Canada and the States from Conception Bay mostly while even the Allan boats take their quota though this is small. As regards those who come along in the Ethio we again assert that most of these went to Canada and the States and that few, if any, went elsewhere. We have this from those who were present, saw the people buy their tickets and chatted with them on the way from Carbonear to Brigus Junction. Their word, we think, is as good as that of the News scribe. This individual not many moons ago saw the "evidence that a wise and progressive government is ruling." Then when certain pickings weren't coming his way nothing was too bad for him to say of the "wise and progressive Government," its leaders and adherents.

CONSTANTINOPLE, To-day.
Mahmoud Shekfat Pasha, Turkish Grand Vizier and Minister of War, was shot by an assassin yesterday. His aide de camp, Lieutenant Ibrahim Bey, was also killed. Prince Said Lahim, Foreign Minister and ex-Premier of the Council of State has been appointed Grand Vizier in his stead. All other ministers return to their portfolios. A man named Topal Tewfik has been arrested on suspicion of being one of the assassins. Captain Schief, who was riding with the Grand Vizier at the time, describes the tragedy as follows:—"We were leaving Brazeed Square when our motor stopped on account of repairs being made to the road. I was at an exhibition, but attached as importance to it, thinking the time had burst, but Shekfat Pasha fell forward. I took him in my arms, held him up, and saw blood in his face. I jumped from the motor to seize the assassins but they fled in their car, with the exception of Topal Tewfik who had no time to get in. One of the assassins in the back of the car fired at me repeatedly, I cannot understand why I was not hit. The motor car used by the assassins was found, and the owner of the car placed under arrest. He has already made certain admissions."

LONDON, To-day.
Lord Willoughby de Broke, Chairman of the British League for the support of "Plaster and Union, issued a lurid appeal for volunteers to join the League and make ready to stand in the trenches with those who are going to defend our common inheritance. The appeal states the League has a hundred agents in different parts of Britain engaged in organizing their fellow countrymen, who are prepared to re-inforce Ulstermen in armed resistance against the tyranny of Home Government. Will Crooks, labor member of the Commons for Woolwich, who is a staunch advocate of women's suffrage, was prevented from speaking at a labor meeting at Caxton Hall last night by suffragettes supported by male champions. Several fights occurred in which the latter were badly mauled and flogging of the hall. Crooks abandoned his speech to prevent further violence.

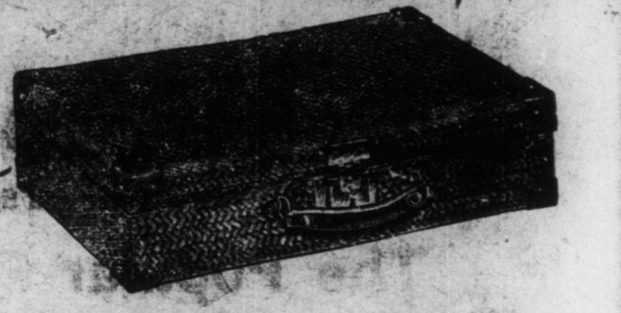
